The serum the Health Department will make and distribute is for the treatment of type of lobar pneumonia, which constitutes about 60 per cent. of all cases.
"The department," Dr. Emerson explains, "wishes to make it very clear that it is not going into the business of treating pneumonia. It is not going to be a wholesale physician. What we will do is to diagnoze any occumonia.
