Remember to File Your Taxes by April 17th

This year, federal tax returns must be filed by April 17, 2012. The deadline was extended by two days because April 15 falls on a Sunday and April 16 is Emancipation Day, which is a holiday in the District of Columbia.

1940 Census Release April 2, 2012



Digital images of the 1940 Census were released by the [National Archives and Records Administration](#) (NARA) on April 2, 2012. The release will provide valuable information for genealogists, historians and researchers. By law, Census records containing personally identifiable information remain confidential for 72 years to all but the individual named on the record or their legal heir.

The 1940 Census includes name, age, relationship, and occupation along with employment status and participation in the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), Works Progress Administration (WPA), and National Youth Administration (NYA) programs; and years of education. Also included in the release is the first census of housing with information about the dwelling, principal

An index for the 1940 Census is not currently available; however, National Archives is leading a community effort to index the 1940 Census. If you would like to help, specialized software is required and is free to download; training and support are also available. Visit the projects web site, www.the1940census.com.



Journal of a company commander from 2003 to early 2004 in some of the most dangerous areas of post-Hussein Iraq discusses tactics, techniques, and procedures in the struggle to maintain order and rebuild the country. It captures the stresses of combat and corresponding emotions, reinforces the ideal of camaraderie among soldiers, and deals with the emotional impact of losing friends in battle.



**SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION
ENDS ANNUAL MAILING**

Unless you are age 60 or older, you will no longer receive your annual Social Security statement in the mail. It has been replaced by a [retirement estimator](#) on the agency's website.

The online estimator calculates your prospective retirement benefit, based on Social Security's records of your earnings but does not offer calculations based on potential disability, spousal, survivor and family benefits and does not include the yearly accounting of taxes paid. SSA is currently developing an update that will include a full-featured online statement.
