Bennettsville. January 23.—Some lime ago two of the trustees of Dargan school district. A. J. David and James Weber. decided to exclude from the Edgewood school the children of Block Boller, on the ground that they were not of pure Caucasian blood, and were causing disturbances in theschool. Roller protested against this action of the trustees and appealed to the county board of education to reverse the trustees and reinstate his children in the school. He employed Judge Townsend to represent him and the trustees retained T. W. Bouchler.

The county board of education, which is composed of Superintendent W. L. Stabton, the flon. H. H. Newton and the Rev. E. P. Easterling, heard the case one day last week. A number of witnesses were examined another than one-eight negro blood.

Mr. Bouchler based his asymment.

Bouchier based his argument

on the following clauses in the State Constitution:
Article 111, Section 33. The mar-riage of a white person with a negro or mulatto, or persons who shall have one-eight or more negro blood, shall be unlawful and vold.

Article XI, Section 7. Separate schools shall be provided for children of the white and colored races, and no

of the white and colored races, and ne child of ether race shall ever be per-mitted to attend a school provided for children of the other race. Mr. Bouchler said that he regrett-ed that no provision had been made for people of Roller's class, but the line was clearly drawn by the fundamental law of the land, and no child which had one-eighth negro blood should be allowed to attend a white

school.

Judge Townsend argued that the first provision of the Constitution applied only to the intermarriage of the races, and that the lines were not so races, and that, fire lines were not so closely drawn in separating the schools. He also argued that Roller's children were white'enough not to be excluded, even, if the intermariage provision should apply to the schools. After carefully considering the evi-dence and the arguments, the board of education rendered a decision sus taining the trustees, so that the chil-dren in question are debarred from at-taining the trustees, and the school.
