Ws gather, from our numerous inquiries upon this subject, that very many do not fully understand

this important part of farming.

There seems to be an impression that we use farillizers for the bane-fit of the soil. This is a great mistake. They are intended to help

quickly available to growing plants. We call these fertilizers. We use them to help make the crops grow more rapidly and mature earlier. We use them because they are

ot soil food, but plant food. Now we see at once that a fertilizer to be good must be such that the first plant will take it up. Hence we use, should use them, so as to get the quickest seturns.

WHY DO WE FERTILIZE,?

Mainly on account of our ignorance and laziness. We don't know that the same ingredients of plant food which we are buying already exist in the soil in abundant supply. Or if we know this we are not willing to do the work necessary to get these from the soil.

We find that by scratching the oil three or four inches and using these bought helps, we can force a fair crop. Hence we prefer to sit about idle all the fall and winter, and then rely upon the fertilizer to make the crop.


