Sketch of Dr. Davis.

The following sketch of Dr. R. O. E. Davis, our talented young fellow townsman, appears in a recent issue of the Greenville (N. C.) Industrial News:
One of the most important witnesses called in the case of Dr. J. B. Matthews in his probability in Dr. R. O. E. Davis, associate professor of chemistry in the University of North Carolina, located at Chapel Hill. Dr. Davis was brought into evidence through his having been employed by Dr. J. P. His research work in the laboratory and his mastery of experimental chemistry occasioned his election to the position of instructor in the department of chemistry at the university after his graduation. His chief aim was to master the science of chemistry, which had become an enthusiasm for him after graduation, pursued its study under the direction of Dr. Charles Baskerville, at that time head of the department of chemistry in the university. Dr. Baskerville is now a professor in the College of New York City.

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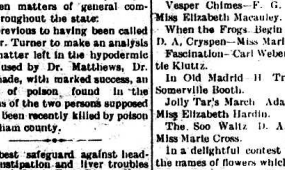

Head End Collision.
Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 there was a serious collision at the Southern depot, which resulted in the tearing up of two cars and the partial destruction of two others, but fortunately resulted in no loss of life. It seems that freight train No. 63 was doing some switching on the main line, when extra freight No. 47, bound north, steamed up the track. The engineer on No. 47 says that his air brakes refused to work and that he was unable to avert a collision. Most of both crews jumped to him to avoid the impending collision so that when the crash came it could result only in the destruction of the rolling stock. The colored fireman on No. 63 was not so fortunate as his fellows, and he was severely injured. The debris was soon removed from the track, but the cars damaged will require a great deal of work before they can be put back to service.
