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AN IDEAL SYSTEM IN SOUTH CAROLINA

How a Long-Term Lease With Provision For Soil-Building Benefits Both Renter and Owner.

A few years ago Mr. K. W. Tate, a banker of the little town of North, S. C., counting some of his land bought a badly run-down farm, the open fields of which were practically washed out to the depth of 18 inches to 2 feet. Mr. Tate became interested in the demonstration methods adopted in soil building through the winter legumes. He secured a tenant, family the head of which had been farming land for his family to cultivate and he hired one or more tenants to supplement the earnings of the little tenant farm which was handled with one male.

Mr. Tate decided that "business is business" and the farm as well as in the bank and he considered the idea of helping that tenant to help him as well to help himself. So he bought rice and citrus + clover seed and gave them to the tenant for crop cover and the interest of the tenant should show and turn such cover crops as desired.

Mr. Tate went into an agreement with the tenant that so long as he worked with the soil building, he should not increase his rental. He even, though the land had doubled in value in production for the purpose of the soil building, the tenant to practice a system that would result in a greater income from the soil for both landlord and tenant and to enrich the soil meanwhile.

Mr. S. H. Maddox, the tenant, is a man with high character. He gave up work elsewhere and in devoting all his time to the farm. The entire family became cheerful and happy. He had the highest praise for their landlord who had the land for lease in a few years of the Maddox family and their efficient work. Mr. Tate believes that in firm tenant work is a poor trade that does not benefit both parties to the transaction.

After the signing and before the winter cover crop was sown, Mr. Tate was using about 400 pounds of 3-3-3 fertilizer per acre and was making about one-fourth bush of cotton per acre. He has been turning out about 800 to 900 bush of cotton per acre for the last two or three years and has less cost for fertilizer per acre. He is now producing one and a half bales of cotton per acre, sells at 27 1/2 cents, and is making a profit of \$1500 per acre.

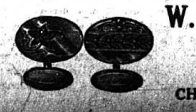
