Parker Has Made Good.

During the presidential campaign of 1904 Judge Parker publicly charged that large corporations were contributing to the Roosevelt election fund that they had joined forces "to perpetuate the present administration," that "corporation managers" "levy upon the assets of stockholders whose they represent such sums of money as they deem requisite to place the government in such hands as they see fit to put in their hands." Three days before the election President Roosevelt issued a general repudiation in which he entered a personal denial of what he called the "unusually and atrociously false" charges made by Judge Parker.

During the recent insurance investigation he was proved by the confessions of men like President McCall and McCarty and Senator Platt that Judge Parker's accusations were well founded.

Chairman Corlison and Treasurer Blinn of the Republican national committee still refuse to remove the seal of secrecy from their books. On Tuesday Republican Senators refused to block arrest requests for Parker and McCarty by national banks. But Judge Parker can afford to rest his case on sworn testimony in the Armstrong case.

Early in the same campaign Judge Parker declared that the common law could be used effectively to cope with the evils of the trust.

President Roosevelt learnedly retorted Judge Parker by asserting that there is no Federal common law. On Monday by his decisions in the Tobacco and Paper Trust cases the United States Supreme Court demonstrated that the common law runs the government with power to convict the trusts and other corporate law-breakers through the compulsory testimony of their own officers. Retraction on Mr. Roosevelt's part at this late date is less important than the fact that the District Attorney Jerome has talked light-heartedly about finding "abundant traces of moral obliquity" in insurance circles, but no "transgression" of criminality. At Jackson, Miss. Tuesday Judge Parker in a formal address before the Mississippi legislature declared:

"After a long judicial experience and some study of this question, I say to you here and now that I do not believe it would be possible in that great metropolitan city to draw a grand jury which would not indict for at least two and perhaps three of the most serious crimes known to the law."
