BOTTLES IN A JURY ROOM.

Empty bottles found in a jury room in the court house in Greenville which room was occupied by a jury that was impaneled with its holding for some time has been the occasion for a good deal of unfavorable comment in the mountain city. The case was a murder case, and it seems that the only way some of the people of that city are able to account for the verdict is upon the theory that the jury was either drunk or so far under the influence of liquor that they rendered a verdict that could not be otherwise accounted for. We understand that the foreman declares that there were bottles in the room, and that the smell of liquor was quite fresh in them, indicating that they had been only very recently full of the vile stuff, but he declares, most emphatically that the jury did not empty the contents into their stomachs. And The Greenville News, in an editorial, denounces the charge as a vile slander. It says it knows these Jurymen did not drink while in that room; for Judge Smith asked them not to drink while sitting on the case, and it is certain that these men had too much respect for the Judge to drink.

Well, we do not know anything about the matter, but we do not hesitate to say these bottles should not have been in the jury room, nor even in the court house, and the sheriff should have seen that the room was in a respectable condition before the jury was placed in it. No room, filled with whiskey bottles, either empty or full or fresh with the smell of the stuff in the right kind of place for gentlemen to be asked to occupy. Certainly, no jury called upon to decide upon the guilt or innocence of its fellow man charged with murder should be in a "spotting" where it would be compelled to come in contact with liquor fumes. It is not a safe proposition. No wonder the people of Greenville are so much exercised over the thing. We do not blame them. It might be a good thing to at least clean out the court house in the Mountain City—Greenwood Journal.

GRAND JURY'S REPORT.

To the Hon. S. W. G. Shipp, presiding Judge at the Spring term of Court of Chester County:
We, the Grand Jury of Chester County, respectfully submit the following as our report:

We have passed upon all bills of indictment handed us by the Solicitor.

The committee appointed to visit the County Farm report as follows:
White inmates, six males and three females. Colored inmates, eight males and six females.

Mules eight, one mare and colts, milk cows eight, yearlings and calves seventeen, brood sows three, bear one, shoats twenty, pigs eleven, six straw one ton, hay ten tons, fodder fifteen thousand bundles, corn about six hundred bushels, oats two hundred bushels, bacon one thousand pounds, molasses one hundred gallons, hard two hundred pounds, crew seed five bushels, cotton seed fifty bushels, sweet potatoes thirty bushels, peas fifty-five bushels, three two-horse wagons, one one-horse wagon, one binder, two mowers, one rake, three harrows, two plow engines (one six-horse and one six-horse), one hay press, harness and all implements for farming in good condition.

We find the inmates well cared for with good bedding, clean and nicely kept.

A new jail has been built recently and Mr. Orr is pleased with results of feeding ensilage. The county has provided steel forms for building concrete silos, and they are available for the use of the farmers of the county.

We recommend that laborers from the chain gang be sent to assist Mr. Orr in preparing and planting his crop.

We recommend that a shower bath be installed at the farm.

We desire to express our appreciation of the services of Mr. and Mrs. Orr, and hope that the county may be able to retain them.

The Grand Jury as a body visited the County Jail and found it well kept.

We recommend that the fence in rear of jail be repaired.

A committee visited the chain gang and made the following report:
The chain gang is located on the highway Ferry Road, about three miles from the City. We found six convicts in good health and well cared for. Also six good shovels, four two-horse wagons and one one-horse wagon in good condition—nine mules, one horse, one mule, one road machine all in good shape. The convicts are all in fairly good shape, and we think that one new tent should be provided.

We found some fine road work being done by Supt. McKee.

We have visited the various county offices and from a partial examination found them well kept. In the Auditor's office we found that the bulk of the fixtures were owned privately by the Auditor. We recommend that the county reimburse the Auditor in the sum of Seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars and take over the furniture.

We recommend that the books of the different offices be audited immediately.

We recommend that the grade railroad crossings at the Burke Mills and one North of Blackstock and others that need attention be attended to by the proper authorities at once.

We understand that the tax at Lockhart Mills is unfair and we desire that the Supervisor take such steps as are necessary to make same safe.

We realize a serious menace in the taking of laborers out of the county to work on the railroads in Virginia and other places and recommend that the County Attorney take steps to have the Railroad Commission make a decision by relay in the other Court Officials for the numerous counties shown us in the discharge of our duties.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

TO QUICKLY EQUIP ARMY OF 50,000

National Defense Council has called for 70-merrow to Disarm Plans.

Washington, March 22.—Secretary of War Baker has called a meeting of the Council on National Defense for Saturday. It is understood the purpose is to discuss providing equipment for an army of 500,000 men, which President Wilson is believed to contemplate calling for when the special session of Congress convenes.

The Advisory Commission of the National Council is composed of practical business men and civilians, and their advice frequently is sought by Secretary Baker and his Cabinet associates at the National Council.

There is not the slightest doubt that all equipment for such an army can be secured without much delay in advance of the need. The advice of the business men and specialists of the advisory commission is desired on questions of organization and mobilization of the industries which would contribute to supplying it.
