BROWN NOTES.

More Profitable Than Cotton.  
 Mr. Lewis Cromer, of Pork township, brought to the city yesterday three three-acre wagon loads of farm produce, and it was neither corn nor cotton. He had a quantity of sorghum cane-seed, Jersey peas and onions. Already this year he has sold over sixty five bushels of cane seed and unnumbered quarts of onions, as well as the product of 25 acres sown in peas.

In reply to a query from a reporter as to whether he considered these crops more profitable than cotton Mr. Cromer said that they undoubtedly were. "For the work they demand and the ground they occupy, taken in connection with the good prices they bring, they are 50 per cent. more profitable than cotton. Will I stop planting cotton? No, I don't carry it that far. As things are now cotton is our staple money crop, and no farmer can afford not to plant a certain amount of it. But I don't intend to put in any surplus acreage. It is a beauty about these side crops is that they come in after the cotton is all gathered and sold, and they bring fair prices."—An-Jerson Mail.

The Case of Burton.  
 It is not known what action the Senate will take in the case of Senator Burton of Kansas. Only one Senator has ever been expelled. William Bount, Senator from Tennessee, was expelled in the first session of the Fifth Congress in 1797. He was charged with writing a certain letter inconsistent with his high office. John Smith, Senator from Ohio, was indicted by the Circuit Court of Virginia for treason and false demeanor. He was mixed up with the Agron Burr conspiracy. That was in 1807. The Senate took the case up and a resolution to expel him stood for expulsion and to against it. As a two-thirds vote was required he was not expelled but sent his resignation.—Spartanburg Spartan.

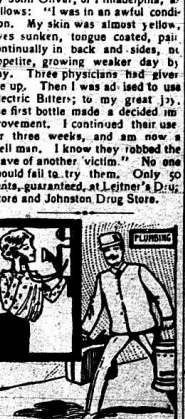
