The Pension Law.

A correspondent writing from Jackson, Miss., says that J. R. Westmoreland, now living and two of his sons entered the Confederate army. In speaking of Westmoreland, he says: "I know of some getting pensions that never did anything, but was a dead expense to the government and was dead." A veteran in speaking of this matter a few days ago, says that he knows a man drawing a pension in another county when his husband was never in the war. We have spoken to the chairman of the county board about the matter and he says when papers are made out and endorsed in a proper manner he can get them. Wireless Message to Pacific Coast.

On Sunday, March 10, A. J. Millison, the operator at the wireless station on Point Loma, in southern California, observed his apparatus intercepting a message. On investigation he ascertained that a message was being sent from Washington, D. C., to Pensacola, Fla. He adjusted his instruments, which are the most delicate in the United States for government, and caught the whole message. At about the same time part of a message to the battleship "Connecticut" was intercepted at the Atlantic coast and sent them, with letters, to the operators there.

Charlotte Broker Held Without Bail. Charlotte, N. C., April 25.—Purvey G. Foyville, who charged with conspiracy in connection with the embezzlement from the Charlotte National Bank of \$25,000, was arrested at Lexington and brought to Charlotte today by secret service officers. Foyville conducted a double bluff in this city and it was through his agency, it is alleged, that Jones conducted the speculations which led him to rob the bank. Foyville's place of business was closed for good by the day of Jones' disappearance and he left for parts unknown and since that time more service officers have vigorously hunted the missing broker. Foyville is alleged to have made a confession implicating Jones and others, but this cannot be verified as the arresting officers refuse to talk or permit their prisoner to be interviewed. He is held without bail for the federal district court.

Must Pay Liquor License. Orangeburg, April 25.—As a result of the inspection of a line of patent liquors by the department of the Columbia Office of the department of Internal Revenue, the drug stores have been compelled to pay a license of \$25 each plus the penalty \$10.50 for handling certain lines of drugs containing a percentage of alcohol larger than that allowed by law. The department has arranged by the chemists in its department. The ruling of Collector Meek Jenkins, who has received instructions from the department at Washington, will probably affect hundreds of drug stores throughout the State.—Special to the State.
