British Declares Condemns Alcohol. A correspondent to the news declaration in favor of alcohol by leading physicians is now published by the medical press over the signatures of a dozen physicians, including Dr. Frederick Treves, Sir James Barr and William Ewart. Referring to the recent manifesto which was dealt with in the dispatch to the Sun, the signatories say: "We are gravely dissatisfied from much of the teaching, nor can we accept it as an authoritative statement of recognized medical opinion on the matter. After traversing some of the conclusions of their colleagues, who advocate alcohol, the signatories further say: "We strongly believe that alcohol is unnecessary as an article of consumption in the case of healthy men and women, and that its general use could be discontinued without detriment to the health of the community. We believe that alcohol is one of the most fruitful sources of poverty, disease and crime, and we are pleased to see that it is now earnestly employed as a remedy."
