LETTER FROM HON. W. B. WYCE ON KNOW NOTHINGISM.

There is no doubt but that the vast accession to the population of the North by foreign immigration is injurious to the South; it strengthens the North, and consequently weakens the South, and in this light it encourages immigration on the contrary it is our policy to discourage it.
