STEFANSSON'S NEW LAND A CONTINENT

Believes It Runs 270 Miles Eastward Far North of His Quarters. White Eskimos.

OTAWA, Nov. 10.—Stefansson, the Canadian Government's Arctic explorer, believes that the newly discovered land in the Beaufort Sea north of which he has planted the Union Jack in the name of the Dominion, is very extensive and will add some thousands of square miles to the territory of Canada.

A detailed report of his explorations and discoveries during the last two years was received today by the Naval Service Department. The land which Stefansson discovered was northeast of the Prince Patrick Land. He spent three days in the land and from what he gathered he believes it runs some 300 miles east but not the north as he could see some mountain ranges. The land had plenty of game.

Mayaguez and Belfast, at 10 Miles South of Cape Cod, Destroyed in Victory-Kitchener's Trip May Carry Him to India or Quail Rising. A large submarine F. Y. WILSON TO START WORK ON MESSAGE

Next Week President Will Confer With New Budget Body of National Financial Needs. Washington, Nov. 10.—President Wilson will begin work next week on his message to Congress. He has called a cabinet meeting for Friday at which one of the items of the government department's messages will be discussed and the work of the president will lay the basis for his message which on Friday will be delivered in person before a joint session of both houses.

Next week the president will confer with the budget and finance committee, which is working on plans for coordinating the government's appropriations and will discuss particularly the program for the execution of national defense. The legislative program and ways of raising money were discussed by the president today with Secretary Underwood and Foster.

SUBMARINE MAKES NEW BLOCKADE LAW

Conclusion May Not Be Reached Until After the War. London, Nov. 9.—Continuing the American note from the viewpoint of the modern development of submarine and the influence it exerts on sea law, the naval correspondent of The Times says lawyers and diplomats must recognize that new conditions are thus imposed.

PROVISION SHOULD BE MADE.

Business houses which have a large number of customers in the rural districts are furnishing their sales with automobiles and some of the finest drive-in cars. They find this advantageous in many ways. More territory is covered in a given time and much more business conducted than by using a horse and buggy. In fact, the time has arrived when any one in a business which requires very much rural travelling must travel in an automobile in order to be able to meet competition.

The money spent by a state county or town should be spent in a business way. For every dollar spent a dollar's worth should be returned by the citizen, as a whole.

Any public office whose duties cover a large rural territory should be provided with the necessary means by which he could transport the people's business in the shortest length of time. In other words, he should travel in a business way, which he cannot be expected to do unless he is provided with the "where-with-all."

GRADE CROSSINGS

In his annual report, President Fairfax Harrison, of the Southern Railway says in part regarding grade crossings. "One of the difficulties of modern railroading is the grade crossings of highways with railroads. These crossings have become, with the growth of population, a menace to the public, and also, in deplorable accidents for which those in charge of railroad trains are not always responsible but are usually held responsible, a drain on the revenues of the company." He goes on to mention improvements being made along this line by the elimination of grade crossings, etc.

If President Harrison would take a "jolt" across the grade crossing at the head of Saluda street he might eliminate it and if he did not he surely would repair it.

Prepayment Saved This Policy

Mr. Claude Westfall, of Clarkburg, W. Va. signed an application for Mutual Benefit insurance on July 17, 1915, and paid the first quarterly premium of \$6.10 to the agent, taking in exchange therefor the Company's binding receipt. He made an appointment for examination the following day, but his wife, for whose benefit the insurance was to be taken, tried to dissuade him from adding to his insurance. The agent, however, finally prevailed upon him to be examined and on July 22nd examination was made. It proved favorable in every respect. The application, which was for a Life Accelerative Endowment policy, \$1,000 at age 31, was received at the Home Office July 26th in accordance with the Company's usual custom. In such cases, however, an inspection was called for which was received August 2nd. This being favorable, the application was approved by the Medical Board and passed on to the policy Department. Policy was issued and mailed on August 3, 1915.

In the meantime on July 26th, Mr. Westfall was taken sick and his trouble was diagnosed as acute peritonitis. On August 3rd he died. 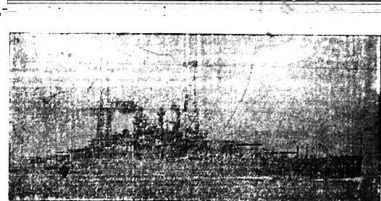
