Noninprious Coffee.

A treated cofee called "stoxicafe" has been described to the French Therapeutic society as ordinary coffee freed from certain digestion-disturbing, products formed during roasting. These products, to be known as cafe-toxin, are volatile, but are only partially volatiled in the roasting, and are coffee under a vacuum and then submitting to steam at a pressure of several atmospheres. The treated coffee, retaining its caffeine unalterated, is unchanged except in avaying less of the substance, found to be really the source of its chief harmfutness when used in access.

RESERVE BANK LAW SUCCESS BY TEST

es of Central Bank Plan Without Having Its Dangers.

Charlotte, N. C. Nov. 23-One ear's test of the federal reserv years test of the federal reserve bank system has shown its superiori-ty over the central bank plan, ac-cording to Paul M. Warburg, of the federal reserve board, who spoke here fonight at a dinner-given by the mayor of Charlotte.

here fought at a dinneh given by the mayor of Charlette.

"Some of my friends," said Mr. Varburg, "sometimes have stated that they believed me to be a central bank man. If I were free today to choose for this country between one central bank or a system constructed upon the federal reserve principle, I should choose they satter. The federal reserve system ploperly, developed to its highest efficiency, will give the country the advantages of a central bank, which in spbatance are centralizated not reserves and mobilization of commercial paper; but sat the same time it. avoids complete centralization, which while assuring higher efficiency and easier operation, would in our country prove a source of danger and attack."

Mr. Warburg said a year had shown what the system can do, bet warned his hearers that they should keep it as it is and not attempt to have the reserve banks become mere commercial institutions. He said he must refrain from comment on the Angle-Freet, 1500,000.000 loan, but that without the federal reserve system the country "could not have

ROADS IN BETTER CONDITION

Split-Log Drag of Great Service in Keeping Thoroughfares in Shape —How it is Built.
