**Forgiving Enemies.**  
It is gratifying to see so much good feeling manifest north and south by the farmers at what in all times has been regarded as an animosity. There are some people on both sides who will never get over the feeling that their former foes were infinitely, eternally, wickedly and unpardonably wrong, while they themselves were spotlessly righteous. There are some rare cases in which this feeling has been fostered by exceptionally aggravating circumstances, but in most cases, those who continue to cherish resentment are the men who did not fight thoroughly fighting mad until the fighting was over. He recognizes that in the weakness of human nature both may have been wrong in some particulars, and even if the wrong was all on the other side, to err is human, to forgive divine.
