### IMMIGRATION COMMISSION.

#### Notes of the Voyage from Mid-Ocean.

Mid-Ocean, May 25, 1907. Mr. Miller, as a few words concerning the trip to Mid-Ocean, and will be of interest to the reader of your paper. As most of them already know this commission was organized at the last session of congress, and its creation grew out of the discussion of the immigration question, which was given a great deal of attention during the session. It was emphasized by the number of amendments that were introduced of conflicting kinds. Some of the present immigration laws made more far, while others wanted them made more stringent. Congress was slow in agreeing to any particular measure and there was much uncertainty as to what should be done for the best interest of the country. Finally it was decided to appoint a commission to investigate the whole matter in all of its phases, and to report its findings to congress. The commission consists of three senators, three representatives and three laymen appointed by the president. The senators are Messrs. Dillingham, Lodge and myself, members of the senate. The representatives are Messrs. Howell, Bennett and Burnett, members of the house committee on immigration. The laymen are Messrs. C. P. Neill, J. W. Jenks and W. B. Wheeler. Senator Lodge, and Mr. Neill, and Mr. Jenks were unable to take the European trip, for different reasons, and they will be studying the immigration question in the United States, and summer while we are abroad. Each member of the commission taking the trip has his wife along. Among others, with the trip, are Mr. Dillingham, Wheeler, a niece of Commissioner Wheeler, Mr. Burnett, a son of Commissioner Burnett, Miss Olive Lattimer, and Mr. A. C. Lattimer, daughter of the Anderson Daily Mail.

The commission sailed from Boston on Saturday, May 18, on the steamer Casco of the White Star line, and yesterday we passed the Azores, stopping for a few hours at Ponta Delgada, on the island of Azores. We left the steamer then on Monday at Naples, and the party will land. The weather has been ideal so far. The trip has been delightful. There has been little if any seasickness.

The commission has already started on board. There are about 400 passengers on board, which class embraces the immigrants, who are returning to their native homes. We have gone among the immigrants and investigations as to their reasons for returning. About 35 per cent. are returning on account of their relatives, and others are going over to visit their relatives back with them. The general condition of all the immigrants is good; they have fair accommodations and the legal requirements of our government with regard to space aboard the ship are satisfactory. Conditions are complied with.

A close inquiry among the passengers, reports of special agents and our own observations, have shown the fact that in order to get permanent benefit from immigration it is necessary to treat the first immigrants in a community well, and to surround them with proper attention. In other words, the wages paid, whether in money or other forms, or in kind, should be equal, or nearly equal, what can be obtained in any other section of our country. If these conditions are met the first immigrants will be pleased and will write back to their friends that conditions are satisfactory and their friends will follow them. On the other hand, if these conditions are not met, the first immigrants will go home where they will not write their friends to come until they have found a place where conditions are satisfactory. Of course it must be borne in mind that conditions generally in our country are better than in any other country. Conditions in different parts of our own country, however, vary, and these variations are not seen by the immigrants as they are by our own people, and they are liable to be misinterpreted by the immigrants. For instance, an immigrant arriving in our country, and the United States may have heard of some other section where, he told, the conditions are much better. It is a natural fact that he should understand the disadvantages of the other section, and should become dissatisfied and want to go elsewhere.

I learn through one of my brother-in-law's acquaintances that the planter of the Azores, which is now being acquired, and succeeded in securing a ship under contract to engage in sugar planting in the Hawaiian Islands. Shortly after our arrival in the United States a general election in California ensued, owing to the recall of the governor prevailing in that state. ### Abandoning a Right.

A law has gone into effect in Missouri providing that insurance and railway companies which transfer case from state courts to the Federal courts shall be subject to the forfeiture of their charters. The law is designed to increase the number of jury trials and not to leave the disposition of cases to Federal judges. The same provision is found in the Oklahoma constitution. It is not likely that the Missouri legislation will survive the scrutiny of the state courts. The question raised is whether the exercise of a right conferred under the Federal constitution can be forfeited by the action of a state legislature or even by a State constitutional convention. If the Federal courts have authority over 20 cases in Missouri, at least for twenty-four hours, it is not likely that they will be able to do so.
