JUNE 15 IS THE LAST DAY FOR BUYING LIBERTY BONDS

GOVERNOR MANNING JOINS LIBERTY BOND COMMITTEE IN URGING PEOPLE OF SOUTH CAROLINA TO ACT QUICKLY

Columbia, S. C.—(Special)—June 15 is the last day upon which Liberty Loan bonds can be purchased, and hence now and that no soldier should be necessary for the state of South Carolina...

"People in the cities, towns and country districts are realizing more and more the great responsibility that rests upon our people to take up all the bonds that have been assigned...

ROOSEVELT WOULD OSTRACIZE SLACKER

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt delivered a scathing indictment of slackers, with especial attention to the "conscientious objector," in an address last night at a patriotic mass meeting in the Hippodrome of 6,000 delegates to the American Medical Association Convention. The Colonel stamped under foot any idea that there might be an iota of stigma attached to being drafted, and called the men who would be drafted more fortunate than their brothers who were not. He said that the boy who was drafted was just as honorable as the boy at Plattsburg or the boy who joined the National Guard. Slackers he called "miserable creatures who should be hunted out of the society of self-respecting men and women."

"Some men talk as if their duty would be fully performed if they were to be drafted, and do not meanly wait. This is a great error. Service under the draft merely presents the minimum duty which will be accepted by the State. It is a pretty poor man who will do more than his minimum duty in this crisis. The man who does not heartily do his full duty by the nation is not fit to be a citizen. He does well, but not exorbitantly well, if he does everything in his power to serve his country. If he will not do this he is an object creature who should be hunted out of the society of self-respecting men and women."

"The rights of universal suffrage," he continued, "can only be maintained if the duty of universal service is accepted. If there are people who deny their obligation of service, they have not the right to vote. If there are men who do not do their full duty, they are not fit to vote."

"I ask you men here so soon as you get back to your country, to try to arrange the hospital assignments and everything of that kind so that the young fellow will be free to volunteer for immediate service in our army."

"We are in the great war for the good of our national honor and international interest and for the sake of humanity and civilization throughout the world. For two years before we entered this war, there had been engaged in a relentless campaign of murder against American women and children and unarmed men. Germany has been milking several months, and there has been a sudden change in the temperature."

"I wish that every American would read Arthur Gleason's book just published, 'Our Part in the Great War,' for no American who reads it can fail to feel his blood boiling with honor and anger over the fearful cruelties it recounts and the shameful folly this country showed in not indignantly taking action to rebuke these practices and in refusing even to prepare to defend itself. No American, if he has a spark of manhood and of the old American spirit in his soul, can fail to feel his heart hardened with purpose, inasmuch as at that time he was in the ranks of the fighting for the right nation standing for the man until it has found a more adequate and overarching victory, and let this man feel that his children will turn from him in shame unless he does all that in him lies to aid in bringing this victory."

"So doctors, do your part, do now. Sign up tonight, sign up tomorrow. Do your part to make—American flag once more the flag of the free and the brave, the symbol of democracy and right throughout the world."

PREVENTS 'MILK ODORS' Avoid Feeds Having High Flavor. Such as Cabbage, Onions and Rotten Wood. Says Clemson.

Several farmers have made complaint to the division of animal husbandry and dairying of Clemson college that two milks from their cows have a peculiar smell and will not churn. Just what is the cause of the trouble cannot be found in the usual conditions when the complaint has been given to the division. The cow is getting nothing but dry feed from their cows several months, and there has been a sudden change in the temperature. The treatment for all such cases is to give the cow some green food or potatoes or turnips. If she is contaminated give her one pound of epsom salt to raise the temperature of her system.

"Difficult churning is due, to trying to churn whole milk or very thin cream at a low temperature; hauling the churn too full and churning at a slow speed; butter should not be in less than 25 minutes. The ordinary feed of the cow will not affect the flavor of the milk. Feed having a high flavor as cabbage, onions and bitter weed will give a bad flavor."
