MID-STIRRING SCENES

Republican Convention Called to Order at Chicago.

SHOUTING FOR ROOSEVELT

Republican National Convention Begins its Deliberations at the Great Coliseum in the Presence of Fourteen Thousand People.

Chicago, June 17.—Amid scenes of stirring enthusiasm the republican national convention of 1908 began its deliberations at noon Tuesday in the presence of an assemblage estimated at upwards of fourteen thousand people, with the sounds of patriotic airs alternating with the frenzied shouts of "Roosevelt, Taft and the other popular heroes, the first notes of the coming struggle from the graceful orator of Michigan, Senator Julius Caesar Burrows, and the initial formalities which started this momentous gathering into meeting.

Lasted Less Than Two Hours. The opening session lasted less than two hours and was less notable for the business accomplished than for the opportunity it afforded of seeing again this stirring picture of the people assembled from every corner of the

country to select a candidate for president of the United States. The actual work of the day was quickly accomplished and committees on credentials, platform, organization etc., prepared for the most important business.

All Roads to the Coliseum. In the day all roads in Chicago turned toward the huge pile known at the Coliseum, with its back toward Lake Michigan, and its spire turrets reaching a rather shabby section of the city. Here centered the convention throngs—state delegations, singly and in groups, some with marching clubs and bands, who banners and flags, the Ohio delegation a huge blue silk standard bearing the portrait of Secretary Taft. At front and rear the great building was beset by steady streams of humanity, until at noon almost every seat in the structure was occupied and each crowd stood outside to catch the echoes from within.

The scene, when the vast assemblage was called to order, was one of impressive dignity, of animation and of life. In the central arena sat the delegates, almost all of them young, strong and back of them their elders, another thousand in number, with the standards of the states rising here and there above the intricate sea of heads.

TAFT IS THE NOMINEE

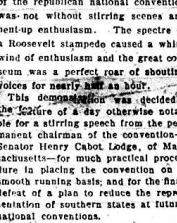
Republicans Chose Him For Their Standard Bearer.

AMID GREATEST ENTHUSIASM

National Convention, After a Turbulent Session, Ballots for the Nomination Of President, Resulting in an Overwhelming Vote For Taft.

Chicago, June 19.—Tiding over every obstacle and safely negotiating the picturesque last barrier of the third-floor sector, the candidacy of William H. Taft for presidential nominee of his party has reached its long-pursued successful conclusion.

Hughes, governor of New York, received 67 votes, Cannon 53, Fairbanks 49, Knox 46, La Pollette 26, Foran 21 and Roosevelt 1.

Probably the most important act of the day, and the one having greatest significance, was the adoption of the report of the committee on credentials, seating the Taft delegates practically in toto. If there had been any lingering doubt as to the desirability of supporting Taft for this decisive action, which, in effect, placed upwards of 700 delegates on a sure and certain basis of the defeat of a plan to reduce the representation of southern states in future national conventions.

A Tumultuous Scene. The picture within the walls of the vast amphitheater as the presidential candidate was named was one truly grandiose in its magnitude. In front, to the right and left, below and above, the following sea of humanity, restless and in motion, was one truly grandiose in its magnitude.

Brilliant Spectacular Features. The scene within the Coliseum was a repetition of that of Tuesday in magnitude and brilliancy of its appointments. The hall, which was occupied, and 14,000 people packed floors and aisles and galleries and bleachers, and the flow of agitation and excitement.

Senator Lodge Takes Chair. The presentation of the report on permanent organization was the signal for Senator Burrows to yield his place to temporary chairman and to elect to the platform the permanent chairman of the convention, Sen. Lodge, of Massachusetts.

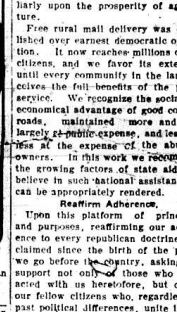

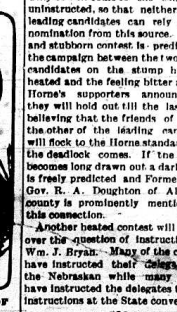
