> ourteen Thousand Men From tern States on Their Way Duty on Mexican Boundary Faire

Leatern States on Their Way to Duty on Maxican Boandary: New York, June 27—Supplies have, been provided along the Maxican bor-der for an arrow of 200,000 men for the next thirty, days, according to an announcement here tonight by the quartermaater department of the U-nited States army. It was also learned from the same source that 2000 motor transport trucks had been purchased from 20. automobile, con-cerns at an average cost of 33,000 each and that bids had been asked of 40 passenger automobile, to be used by the officers of the various commands along the border. Maj, Gen. Leonard Wood, com-inght astated that 14,001 troops from New York, New Jersey, Masachu-stata, Connectitut and Vermont fow are enroute to the border.
