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**SENATORS OPPOSE PAYING FAMILIES OF GUARDSMEN**

**Committee cuts Out Appropriation of \$31,000,000—Would Let Men With Dependents Be Discharged.**

Washington, June 24.—A favorable report on the House resolution authorizing the Senate to draft immediately into the Federal Reserve National Guardsmen willing to take the prescribed oath was ordered today by the Senate Military Committee after it had stricken out a section appropriating \$1,000,000 for the relief of dependents of guardsmen and another limiting the term of service to three years.

A substitute adopted for the relief provisions would direct that the dependents with dependents having no means of support be discharged.

Action on the resolution by the Senate was postponed until Monday because a memorial session in tribute to the late Senator Bradley of Kentucky was in progress.

As reported by the committee, the measure otherwise stands as it originally was reported to the House with the House amendment declaring that an emergency now exists calling for the use of troops other than regulars instead of leaving the question to be determined by the President. Service of guardsmen taken into the Federal army is limited only to "the period of the emergency."

Senator Reed provoked a spirited debate in the Senate by proposing a bill to pay the enlisted men of the National Guard \$30 a month when mustered into the service. Senators Gore and Thomas opposed it, declaring that it was an imputation upon the patriotism of the men.

"No such favoritism," said Mr. Gore, "has been shown before to the special defenders of this country. In addition there is a proposition under the House resolution to pay the families of National Guardsmen \$50 a month while their soldier men are away from home. That would be setting a precedent for universal pensions."

Senator Gore declared that he had no objection to the \$400,000 organized rural mail carriers but would not hear the appeal of 6,000,000 unorganized farmers.

"What would Congress do before 400,000 well organized National Guardsmen?" he asked. "Are they come, with a plea for double pay and \$50 a month for their families while they fight. Shall we send manicurists, chiropodists and other servants for the summer soldiers? This is no silly time. We must deal with war-ghin-faced war."

Senator Gore intimated that National Guard soldiers were commercial patriotism.

"Except for the usual performance of the Senator from Oklahoma," said Senator Reed, "I would not take up the time of the Senate further at this time. The implication that the National Guard is here seeking more pay springs from the over-heated, over-credulous brain of the Senator from Oklahoma. Men not here as representatives of the military or the specialists, but these quiet, determined, patriotic people who will maintain this Nation at whatever cost."

"Some of the young men enlisted in the National Guard for this war will never return to their mothers and fathers. To sit safely behind a machine gun and draw \$7,500 a year, and sneer at the men who go to fight for the country is an unworthy of the Senator of Oklahoma. These members of the National Guard expect to muster in and fight. To refer to them as summer soldiers, who want to take chiropodists, and manicurists for a holiday, is a charge that the Senator should not have been guilty of. These men go not for money, but to fight for their country. I hope war will not be declared. All good citizens are for peace, but this country is going to prepare to defend itself."

"I am defending the young men of the National Guard against their friends in Congress," said Mr. Gore. "God save us from all such defenses," retorted Mr. Reed. "What did the Senator mean when he said a political machine of 400,000 National Guardsmen would make demands on Congress when the war is over if he is defending them?"

"God forgive us if the time ever comes that we must defend this Republic with an army of mercenaries," said Senator Thomas.

The Reed proposition for more pay would cover to a later session.

**AUTOMOBILES FOR WAR NEED**

New York, 27.—Automobile manufacturers are prepared to furnish the government on short notice with some hundred motor trucks and a thousand light automobiles and ambulances, says Alfred Reeves, General Manager of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce. Reeves says this information was given the war department at a recent meeting of the industry board to the general relief of army.

**CONONEL TO OFFER DIVISION TO ARMY**

**Roosevelt Willing to Raise —12,000 Men and Head Troops as Major General.**

New York, June 27.—Theodore Roosevelt is preparing to offer a division of approximately 12,000 men to the United States government, accompanied by his application for a commission as major general in the event of war with Mexico and a call by the president for volunteers. It was learned here tonight from authoritative sources.

Elaborate plans have been made quietly to recruit the organization from picked men throughout the country, and it is said that Col. Roosevelt had worked out every detail that would expedite the mobilization of the large fighting unit. Even the horses and mules necessary are said to have been pledged.

The division will consist, it is reported, of four brigades instead of three as specified in the army regulations. In the division will be cavalry, infantry, field artillery, aeroplane detachments, engineers, signal corps and the most modern field hospital equipment an ample number of machine guns will accompany the division.

It is understood Col. Roosevelt and his aides have consulted with his friends in the regular army holding high rank and the entire scheme has been received with approval.

If it is possible the principal commanding officers will be drawn from the regular army. Recruiting for the division has been done to a large extent in the West and Middle West, principally among men who have had previous military experience.

The main equipment for the division, it is said, will have to be supplied by the war department. It is reported machine guns and aeroplanes are being manufactured by private concern.

Col. Roosevelt's friends say he has been receiving many offers from heads of military organizations to supply him with men should he contemplate raising a force.

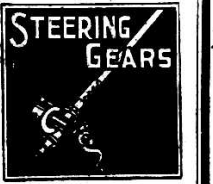

**CAMP STYX.**

There are a number of people who never heard of Styx, South Carolina, until the militia was ordered to mobilize there a few days ago.

Styx was the name given by the ancient Greeks to the mythological stream in the underworld which the dead had to cross. The Greeks used to bury their dead with coins in their hands so that they might pay the ferryman Charon his fee.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL.**

**Lesson II—Third Quarter, For July 9, 1916.**

**THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.**

Text of the Lesson, I Thess. 1 and II, 13-16—Memory Verses 16, 16, 17 Galat. 6:7 by W. G. Maresh. Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stewart.

It is grand to have a whole epistle to meditate upon this week, and especially such a one as this, so full of the glorious truth of our Lord's second coming and its two stages, first to the rapture of His church, and to the destruction of this world, and the setting up of His kingdom of righteousness and peace. The references to His coming in each chapter we give in last week's lesson, and before taking it up more fully let us receive a few heart lessons from the whole letter. It is from the three with whom we have been traveling recently, Paul and Silas and Timothy, faithful and devoted witnesses to the risen living Christ, and it is to the believers who lived on earth at Thessalonica, but were really in God the Father and in the Lord Jesus Christ, as to their heavenly standing (I Thess. 1: 1; II Thess. 1: 1). It was by the gospel of God and of Christ, in the power of the Holy Spirit, that they were led into this holy position and the assurance of it, and the apostles' desire for them was that they would walk worthily of the Lord, who had called them to this great joy and called them into His kingdom and glory (chapter 1: 5 & II, 2, 3 & II, 12 & 13).

The one only thing that a sinner is asked to do and can do is to turn from his sin, to God and receive the Lord Jesus Christ as his own personal Saviour. That makes him to be in God and in Christ and secures to him the benefits of the finished work of the Lord Jesus, life eternal, the forgiveness of sins, acceptance in Christ and a joint heirship with Him without any works whatever or any merit on the part of the sinner.

Having eternal redemption, our one occupation is summed up in serving the living and true God, which means with quietness doing our own business, giving the place He assigns us, living together with Him in children of light rejoicing in everything giving thanks and trusting the God of Peace to do all in us and through us because of His faithfulness (chapters 1: 9, 10; II: v. 5, 10, 16-18, 23, 24).

Having become followers of Christ, who suffered everything and was killed for our sakes, we must not shrink from suffering with Him and being killed for His sake, never pleasing men, but only and always pleasing God, who trieth our hearts (chapters 1: 6; II: 14, 15; III: 4). Being delivered from the wrath to come, of which He speaks more fully in the second epistle, our attitude should always be that of waiting for His return. Our individual personal salvation is a threefold work, for we are working for it, and we wait for the redemption of the body at His coming. This is simply stated in chapter 1: 9, 10, but see also I Thess. II, 11-13; II: John III, 1, 2. There is another and larger threefold view of salvation, covering the whole church, which shall be dealt with at His coming, when the salvation of all Israel at His coming back with us in His glory, and after that the salvation of all nations, so that "salvation is of the great mercy of the Lord, reaching on to the kingdom when the earth shall be filled with the glory of the Lord."

Paul seems to have taught so much about the blessed hope and anticipated events that his hearers feared lest those who had died had missed a great blessing and privilege, but he assured them that those who might remain until the Lord came would not prevent or go before or gain any advantage over those who had died or, as to their bodies, fillers arise (chapter II, 23-25). I have many friends who think that between death and resurrection the soul sleeps, and that there is no conscious existence, but I cannot find any confirmation in Scripture for such a belief, so I tell my friends that if I shall die I shall be ready to meet my Lord on believing Phil. 1: 21, 23; II Cor. v; Rev. vi, 9-11; Luke xiv, 22.

As to His coming for us and our meeting Him in the air (chapter II: 16-18, with I Cor. x, 23, 31; 62, makes it very real. The Lord Himself shall descend, the same Jesus who ascended from the Mount of Olives (Acts 1: 11), a triumphant and visible one, and all the dead bodies of believers, whether buried in the earth or in the depths of the sea or burned to ashes, shall come to life, and those who once lived in them when they were mortal bodies, shall have since death been with Christ in glory, shall live again in the resurrection, shall be with Him in the air, and meet Him in the twinkling of an eye, all living believers shall be changed without dying and, together with those who have died, shall be with the Lord, and shall receive His glory, and shall be with Him forever.

### ITALIANS MAKE FURTHER GAINS

Important Places Taken by Victor Emmanuel's Men in Their Forward Rush.

Rome, June 27 (via London).—Following up their recent successes on the Trentino front the Italians have driven back the Austrians still further, the war office announced today. The Italians have captured Poiana and Arterio.  
The war office also announced the capture of Mounts "Sara Taverle, Spitz, Kerreale and Vlna-Deli. Satta and the crests on the Caldera and Campanella.

The statement follows:  
"Between the Adige and the Brenta our advance continued notwithstanding the enemy's attempt to hold us by the concentrated fire of artillery and machine guns and by resolute actions, which were favored by the difficult ground. In the valley of the Arsa we advanced yesterday across strong entrenchments at Mattassone and Anghebeni and completed the conquest of Monte Menafelle.

"Along the Poiana line we cleared the enemy from the southern slopes of Monte Arata, and after crossing the stream took Poiana and Arterio, thus beginning the advance on the northern side of the valley.  
"On Sette Comuni plateau our infantry, preceded by cavalry patrols, reached the Punta Corbin-Trusch-Cyber-Ford-Cosana line, extending to the southwest of Asago. To the northeast we crossed the Nov valley and occupied Monte Piara, Monte Taverle, Spitz, Kerreale and Cima Della Satta.

"On the right our Alpine troops carried the crests on the Caldera and Campanella, after much gallant fighting.  
"Along the whole front there is considerable evidence of the enemy's barbarous methods. Arterio was destroyed by fire. Asago and many small villages were reduced to smoldering ruins. Near Magna Bozza, some 100 dead bodies of members of our soldiers were found in a line.

"In the Sugana valley the situation is unchanged. In upper Valsi we occupied Mont D. Tognolo. There were no events of importance on the remainder of the front.  
"One of our divisions consisting of ten machine gunners, destroyed 50 heavy bombs on the Calliano railway station in the Lagarina valley. Satisfactory results were observed. The machines returned safely. This morning an Austrian aeroplane was brought down in a fight near Verona."

# Federal Inquiry or Railroad Strike?

Faced by demands from the conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen that would impose on the country an additional burden in transportation costs of \$100,000,000 a year, the railroads propose that this wage problem be settled by reference to an impartial Federal tribunal.

With these employees, whose efficient service is acknowledged, the railroads have no differences that could not be considered fairly and decided justly by such a public body.

## Railroads Urge Public Inquiry and Arbitration

The formal proposal of the railroads to the employes for the settlement of the controversy is as follows:

"Our conferences have demonstrated that we cannot harmonize our differences of opinion and that eventually the matters in controversy must be passed upon by other and disinterested agencies. Therefore, we propose that your proposals and the proposition of the railroads be disposed of by one of the steps of the following methods:

1. Preferably by submission in the Interstate Commerce Commission, the only tribunal which, by reason of its accumulated information bearing on railway conditions and its control of the revenue of the railways, is in a position to consider and protect the rights and equities of all the interests affected, and to provide additional revenue necessary to meet the added cost of operation in case your proposals are found by the Commission to be just and reasonable; or, in the event the Interstate Commerce Commission cannot, under existing laws, act in the premises that we jointly request Congress to take such action as may be necessary to enable the Commission to consider and promptly dispose of the questions involved; or
2. By arbitration in accordance with the provisions of the Federal law" (The Newlands Act).

## Leaders Refuse Offer and Take Strike Vote

Leaders of the train service brotherhoods, at the joint conference held in New York, June 1-15, refused the offer of the railroads to submit the issue to arbitration or Federal review, and the employes are now voting on the question whether authority shall be given these leaders to declare a nation-wide strike.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is proposed by the railroads as the public body to which this issue ought to be referred for these reasons:

No other body with such an intimate knowledge of railroad conditions has such an unquestioned position in the public confidence.

The rates the railroads may charge the public for transportation are now largely fixed by this Government board.

Out of every dollar received by the railroads from the public nearly one-half is paid directly to the employes as wages; and the money to pay increased wages can come from no other source than the rates paid by the public.

The Interstate Commerce Commission, with its control over rates, is in a position to make a complete investigation and render such decision as would protect the interests of the railroad employes, the owners of the railroads, and the public.

## A Question For the Public to Decide

The railroads feel that they have no right to grant a wage preferment of \$100,000,000 a year to these employes, now highly paid and constituting only one-fifth of all the employes, without a clear mandate from a public tribunal that shall determine the merits of the case after a review of all the facts.

The single issue before the country is whether this controversy is to be settled by an impartial Government inquiry or by industrial warfare.
