Washington, July 2.—Secretary Shaw today offered to the public \$20,000,000 of bonds of the Panama Canal authorized by the Congress of 1906. The bonds will bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent and will be dated August 1, 1906, and interest will be payable quarterly.
