Washington, July 9.—The war department tonight announced that there is a shortage in applications from persons who desire to enter the second series of officers' training camps the time for application for which will close July 15. From the two Carolinas, Georgia, Florida and elsewhere in the Southern department, the total number of applications is 400 below the quota for that section. For those States the total number of applications is 2,400 and the quota is 3,114. Applicants for the first series of camps totaled 100,000 four times the number that could be accepted. Some applications are that they will be accepted during the second series of the camps which opens August 1st. All other States

WILL TAKE HAND IN LIQUOR CASES

Charleston, July 9.—That the federal courts of this State will take a vigorous hand in enforcing the liquor laws set forth in the United States statute that went into effect on July 1, and which makes it a federal offense to bring liquor illegally into prohibition territory, such as South Carolina, even though it does not interfere with the quart a month act was indicated today when a negro, Yoe Islam, was brought before United States Commissioner Huger, charged with violating the liquor statute, which recently went into effect and banished Yoe for trial at the Alcon term of court, in October. The interesting part of this case is that Islam, who was arrested by State liquor constables, has been shown arrested by the federal authorities, which indicates that the bulk of smuggling liquor cases are now being taken by the federal courts.
