CHESTER MEN WHO WILL BE CALLED FIRST

List of those who will go before local board first to be called within ten days or two weeks—Chester. To Furnish 227 Men.

To supply the quota required for Chester county—227—for the first contingent of the new National Army, title that number—454—will be called before the local board, an early date, for examination. Those who are disqualified physically, and those who have dependents, in accordance with the regulation, will be discharged for the present. Those who do not come within this class will be accepted. The first examination will continue until the required number—227—have been secured. If, after examination, 454 men the board fails to get the necessary 227 men then, in accordance with their standing, will be called and the examination continued until 227 men have been secured. Every man who registered June 5th, was given a serial number, a list of which is posted at the Court House, and on last Friday every number in the United States was drawn. This plan gives every man his standing in the selection. The first number drawn is the first man to be called and the last number drawn is the last man to be called.

THE DRAFT LIST.

The draft list we are publishing today is not an official list but we feel confident that the first 454 names we have listed, are correct since we have checked same from four different daily papers, The New York Times, The Philadelphia Ledger, The Atlanta Journal and the Columbia State. The numerical numbers we have listed have something to do with the order in which their names have been drawn by the War Department. This notice will require one-third of those men to appear at the Court House on a day fixed in the notice for physical examination. The day fixed for the first examination will be five days after the date of the notice. If it is necessary to examine more men others will be notified. The men will be notified in the order in which their serial numbers were drawn by the War Department. But every man will be notified until the quota is obtained. The law will not stop until the full number called for is secured.

The first thing for any man to do after he gets the notice is to stand the physical examination at the Court House in Chester, S. C., on the day appointed for him to stand his examination. He will have at least five days notice of this date. The law requires him to keep posted and informed as to this date and he can do this by reading the newspapers or by getting his mail but he will be bound to find out at his own risk what day the physical examination is to be held. The physical examination will be the first step for any man to take, therefore the Board will give notice in the newspaper and by mail to let every man know when his physical examination will be held. The physical examination of every man will be held at CHESTER COURT HOUSE.

The War Department has called 227 men of military age under the first draft. The Local Board for this County is required to carry out the law in regard to furnishing this quota of men. The Board will be glad to give all information necessary in the notice for exemption, and delay for the information to be given according to the rules and regulations of the President in regular order, publicly, as the law requires, and not to each individual person privately. This will save time, labor and trouble. The work of the Local Board is very heavy and tedious and it will take all of the time of the Local Board to do the work, and it will save time, trouble, and delay for the Government. They are the men who are to bear arms and to fight. They are the ones who have been called on to respond to brave soldiers and to show their loyalty, manhood, grit, heroism and patriotism. The call has come for men to serve and not for men to be excused. Those who have already enlisted in the National Guard, regular Army and Navy have made their response. They have answered first. Now those who are drawn first will answer next. Those who are drawn among the last numbers will be called to answer later. They have not been excused and they are on the waiting list. Therefore, every true man of military age is still subject
