## WAR SKETCHES:

### Operations of Company D, 17th Regiment, and Incidents of Camp Life From 1861 to 1865.

The men dashed tired from marching and loss of sleep and very hungry, but to be prepared their dinner had been already made to eat it before they were called out and formed in line of battle along the main Five Forks road. When the brigade covering Five Forks and Wallace's brigade were sent away from getting in line the enemy rushed on our line in full force and the fighting was at close range and fierce. Our men held their position and stubbornly held the enemy in check until about the middle of the afternoon, when Sheridan's whole force of 25,000 men came up and overlapped us on the left when we were completely flanked. Warren's whole corps was thrown against Wallace and Ransom's brigades, which were attacked in front and flank at the same time in an open stand on light, as we had only the semblance of protection in front and none on the flank. The fighting was ferocious and bloody until we were completely overlapped by superior numbers, when we commenced to retreat by the right flank, being in great danger of capture as we had stood our ground until it was about late in the afternoon. Pickett's whole command became general and the majority of them killed, wounded or captured. Lt. Col. Dyer was killed, Wallace was a prisoner. The command of the regiment devolved on Capt. E. A. Crawford, the ranking commanding officer. After marching for about a mile the remainder of the regiment with the balance of Gen. Johnson near Ford's depot was marched back to the rear. It entrenched and remained until 2 a. m. when it was moved across the creek and camped. On the morning of the 3rd of April the retreat was continued in the direction of Amelia court house, taking the Nanawetum road at Nanowin church in order to cross Creek at Brown's bridge. The brigade had a skirmish with some of the enemy's cavalry before getting to the bridge, who were easily dispersed. The bridge was crossed, the regiment moved hurriedly on near Batts bridge over the Appomattox to the 4th moved on in the same direction and entrenched some miles from Amelia court house, where the road from Tabernacle church crosses the road to the court house. The enemy's cavalry was sent on to oneforces by the way of the Tabernacle road, but were easily repulsed. On the 5th the command marched toward Amelia court house. The march started at 1 p. m. of the 6th of April, when it was placed in line of battle and drove back some cavalry and entrenched some distance. The brigade was then moved farther on in the previous line of march and ordered to hold a position in the edge of a piece of woods. About 5 o'clock the march was resumed and the brigade again moved forward with the whole division in line of battle. As soon as the brigade got out of the woods in an open field and we rushed across the field to a lane, where a lot of wood was on fire, crossed the fence and drove up the slope through the woods to a branch, where the enemy made a vigorous attack on the left flank, completely routing the brigade. The men falling back on the right flank were reassembled and marched to a road on which the army was moving when it joined the column and arrived at High Bridge, where the march continued at that 2 p. m. moved to Farmville and forced on the hill on the north side of the Appomattox and about 3 p. m. left there with the balance of the army in the direction of Lynchburg, continuing the march until 10 o'clock p. m. Moved out next morning, the 8th, about daylight and arrived near Appomattox in the afternoon and about 10 a. m. formed in line to meet a threatened attack. About 2 p. m. was moved to Appomattox station and again formed in line, the men sleeping on their arms. The next day, April 9th, with the balance of the army moved to Appomattox. Grant, after the formalty of paroling the men was over and drawing rations of crackers and meat from the Federal, the general ordered that his respective homes in prison. Thus ended the war experience of Co. D, 17th R. I. C. V.
