**How to Check a Nosebleed.**

When the nose is bleeding, never stop it by putting anything into the nostrils in any way. This only causes further rush of blood to the broken tissues and makes the flow more profuse. The best way to stop a nosebleed is to hold the nose up and in. The flow being caught in handkerchiefs or cloths, one of the most effective and simple means of stopping a nosebleed is to press the thumb on the upper lip. Near the surface of the lip, runs the artery through which the blood flows. The pressure of the thumb closes the artery. If this is pressed, the flow of blood is stopped. The best method is to hold the nose up and in. The blood around the broken tissues to coagulate and seal up the opening. After trying pressing the thumb on the upper lip and the tip of the nose, if it does not succeed, a drug store is near, get some adrenalin, saturate a piece of gauze with it and apply to the interior of the nose. The adrenalin contracts the vessels of the nose.

**How to Clean a Fan.**

To clean a fan place it in a dish and wash it in gasoline. Do not attempt to rub the material, but let the gasoline wash it off. If the fan is made of wood, it is all probability torn apart. Press tightly until the dirt comes out. Then wash it in gasoline. The dirt will be off. After it has thoroughly dried cover with talcum powder. It is best to clean a fan in this way. Edgemoor's School. Corner Stone of New Building Laid Thursday. Last Prominent Mason and Others Present.
Thursday was a gala day in the little town of Edgemoor. For months and months the people of Edgemoor and progressive Little towns have been looking forward to the laying of the corner stone of their handsome new school building, and on Thursday the occasion so long looked for, was celebrated with befitting ceremonies.
At 10:30 a. m. the crowd gathered at the church and was called to order by Mr. R. D. Robinson, chairman. Rev. R. A. Lummus, of Richburg, offered an appropriate prayer, in which he invoked the divine blessing on the assemblage and the occasion that they were called together to celebrate.

Dr. J. N. Gaston next delivered a beautiful address of welcome, in which he made all of the guests feel that Edgemoor was glad to have them present. Music followed, and then the crowd repaired to the school house, where in the presence of a vast assemblage Grand Master J. L. Michie of Darlington, laid the corner stone.
After a prayer by Rev. W. H. Dickert, of Rock Hill, the crowd repaired to the Rock Hill cemetery, where they listened to addresses from Prof. D. G. Caldwell, of Erskine College, S. E.
