 The rules and regulations as prescribed by President Wilson allow a man a certain number of days to report for examination after the mailing of the notice to appear by the local board. Unless the party ordered to appear before the local board does certain things within a specified time he is recorded as physically unqualified military duty.

**EXAMINATIONS ARE COMPLETED**

The 454 men who were ordered to report before the Chester county local board Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday have all been examined, physically, with the exception of 24 parties who have either enlisted in the service or failed to appear for their examination. The local board actually examined 420 men in the three days and of this number 20 have been turned down on account of being physically unfit for army service. Excluding those who were not present for examination and also those who failed to pass the examination, there were 340 men in the first call, who are physically qualified to serve in the service. Just how many of the 340 physically qualified will be exempted is not yet known and will not be until the claims for discharge have been gone into by the local board, however, it is estimated that between 150 and 200 men out of the 340 will be selected for service.

Since Chester county's quota is 227 men it now looks as if the local board will have to consider the physical examination and unless you have cause to be discharged on account of discharge, your occupation will be called upon for mobilization camp probably next month.

**MARRIED MEN NOT EXEMPT**

Law Permits Local Boards to Use Discretion in Exempting Men With Dependents, Proves Marshal General Crowder's View Government

Provy Marshal General Crowder has sent the following telegram to governors of all States with reference to his ruling concerning dependents of the young of marriage:

"Please call attention of local boards to the fact that a soldier's pay is not less than \$30 a month and that all clothing, subsistence, medical treatment, and housing are furnished him. Under the law he may allot any portion of his pay to a dependent. Many soldiers receiving \$30 a month are actually able to save \$25 monthly to the support of dependents."

"In case of death in line of duty the Government will pay to the beneficiary designated by the soldier six months' pay. Section 4 of the selective service law provides that those in a status with respect to persons dependent upon them for support which renders their exclusion of discharge inadvisable may be discharged, but it does not require that they shall be discharged in all cases."

"The discretion of local boards is invoked by this provision and such boards may well take the facts related above into consideration in deciding claims for discharge due to dependency with a view to determining whether, as a matter of fact, the person claiming such discharge will be in as good or better position to support his dependents after section for military service than he was before. If such is the case, the discharge should not be granted."

**Boy Loses Life in River**

Coroner J. Henry Gladden was called to Great Falls yesterday afternoon to hold an inquest over the body of John Williams Robinson, the eleven year old son of Mr. R. Glenn Robinson, of that place.

Young Robinson, along with three other boys was in bathing and in some manner Franklin Watts, one of the boys, got into water over his head and being unable to swim was sinking. The Robinson lad, who could swim, went to his rescue. The Watts boy managed to get hold of a willow limb and pulled out, but young Robinson was drowned.

The accident occurred yesterday about two o'clock and happened just before the spill-way at Great Falls.

The body was brought to Chester and taken to Whitmire today where the inquest will be made.
