GOOD ROADS DAY TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 5

The first county wide movement to be inaugurated by the Chamber of Commerce is that of Chester County Good Roads Day, September 5, and to be conducted under the auspices of the Bureau of Agriculture of the chamber. The preparatory plans for this day on which every man and boy of the county, including those residing in the several townships and the city of Chester as well will be asked to do a days work on the county roads, were outlined at a meeting of the special committee appointed by the bureau on last Friday morning. Two members of the chamber being selected to lay the matter before the residents of each of the eight townships of the county and ten residents of each of the townships being appointed as a local committee to co-operate with the bureau in carrying the plans completed.

On Wednesday, August twenty-third, there will be a meeting of each of the townships, at convenient points yet to be selected, at which the people of the townships will be asked to gather and have the matter presented to them by the representatives of the chamber. The present arrangement is that the meeting will be held at the same hour on this day, and at the same time, and without the expense of the public money.

Since the announcement of Good Roads Day was made last Friday's issue many of the citizens of the county have offered their services to the chamber and a number of the people of Chester have been selected to do that they would furnish teams and labor for repair work in different sections of the county. While it is desired that every township should do considerable work himself that day, yet any who desire to furnish the equivalent either in men or teams are notified that the same assignments will be made for them several days before Good Roads Day.

Great good can be done through this movement by the co-operation of the people in all sections of the county and it is not unlikely that the ladies of many of the sections will arrange picnic dinners for the workers on the roads.

GERMANY TO SEIZE RED CROSS SUPPLIES

Navy Ordered to Act in Retaliation in Against Great Britain for Bartering Them.

London, Aug. 8.—The Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin publishes a memorandum issued by the German Government which states that, owing to British treatment of Red Cross supplies, Germany will no longer allow free passage for such supplies. German naval forces will receive orders to take such articles for their own use when they come within their reach.

The memorandum says: "Great Britain, although she had originally assented to safe passage of such articles, having declined to accept the proposals of the American and Spanish Governments, having even refused to allow the American Red Cross organization to despatch them to the German Red Cross Society, and having further declined to listen to a protest from former President Taft on the subject, Germany is no longer in a position to grant free passage of surgical and medical requisites coming within the power of her naval forces, as she has done up to now."

"The German navy will receive orders to exercise in the future the right pertaining to it to requisition the medical and surgical requisites mentioned in the Spanish Government's list for the use of German military forces."

The British Government has refused to permit the forwarding of Red Cross supplies through the blockade line of the allies into Germany and Austria. In a recent memorandum submitted to the American Government Great Britain said this practice had been forbidden in all blockades established in the past.
