GAFNEY LAB RISKED LIFE TO SAVE NEGRO.

Gafney, Aug. 15.—Ed Coyle of Gafney last Saturday performed a deed of heroism which should entitle him to a Carnegie medal. While two negro laborers were working at the Drake dam in a boat the craft capsized and the occupants were thrown into the stream. One of them swam to the bank but the other, unable to swim, was swept down the stream with the current. Young Coyle, who had had his back broken in youth and who weighs only about 120 pounds, ran out on the bridge which spanned the stream and, hanging from one of the cables, caught the negro as he passed beneath him, thus saving his life. The negro weighs some 300 pounds and was held by young Coyle until E. B. Francis, who was working on the job, rescued them. The negro, whose name is Manual Rogers, is deeply grateful to young Coyle for saving his life as he had already gone under twice when the boy caught him.
