GOOD ROADS MEETING MONDAY

With a mass meeting of the men of the city of Chester on next Monday at 11 a. m. in the Court House, the campaign for Chester County Good Roads Day, September 5, will close. Meetings have been held in all the townships of the county and in every section large and enthusiastic crowds greeted the representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and went into the townships to organize the men there for work on Good Roads Day.

The closing meeting of the county was held yesterday at Lowryville when a number of the good road squads and laid out the work for that section of Chester township. Several roads in that immediate section will be the scene of the activity of good road squads, but the largest task to be undertaken will be rebuilding the old macadam road from the limits of the City of Chester to the poor house farm. It is expected that there will be in the neighborhood of 100 wagons and about that number of hands on this job of reconstruction.

Not only has the enthusiasm been shown in the various country districts of the county, but a large number of the men of Chester have made their intention to do their share towards making better roads on that day. Yesterday Mayor Z. V. Davidson issued a proclamation calling upon every man of every creed, color and station in this work. The men of the city are also requested to do their work on the county roads outside the city limits and not on the streets of the city.

An unusual feature of Good Roads Day will be motion pictures taken along the route of the activity, arrangements having been completed with Manager Pennington of Dreamland Theatre to take charge of this. Almost daily endorsements of the movements are received at the office of the Chamber of Commerce, from people in every section of the county. A few of these endorsements received by Secretary Lloyd are as follows.

Mr. J. B. Kilgore, Great Falls, says "Think your idea an excellent one, and I am glad to co-operate with you." Willis G. Gage, Manager, Manetta Mills, Lando, says "I think this a good plan, and sincerely trust it can be worked up to a successful issue in the county, and to produce good and lasting results." Mr. W. H. Hamilton, Edgemore, says "The idea is a good one and you can work up enthusiasm on the subject."

At the Mass Meeting of the citizens of Chester on Monday arrangements will be made for organizing the work to be done by the citizens of the city and it is requested that every man of the city will attend this meeting, which will last all day. The meeting will commence promptly at 11 o'clock and will be held in the Court House.

Mr. H. S. Jaudon, Consulting Road Engineer, will address the meeting. Added to the desire of the several communities to do something of value for the county on Good Roads Day is the spirit of rivalry and jealousy those not familiar with the details of the plans of the townships might think it to be impossible that many of the plans made at the township meetings will be carried out yet the determination of the men and the spirit of co-operation shown at the meetings lead those familiar with the plans to believe that even more work will be done than is laid out.

Chester county should feel proud that no factionalism has entered into this city last Tuesday night. The addresses delivered were along the same line as those at Ardena, where the campaign opened and which were published in this paper.

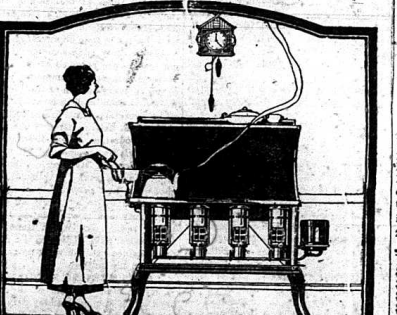

IT'S THE LONG BLUE CHIMNEY

SOMETHING OF A HIGHFLYER.

M. S. Lively, for the past five years confidential clerk and bookkeeper for John T. Roddey of Rock Hill, is a defaulter to a very considerable amount. This fact has been street talk in Rock Hill for more than three weeks; but it has not been published previously. A representative of The Enquirer heard something of the subject when in Rock Hill last Saturday and took the trouble to make such investigations as were practicable. The street stories were rather vague, but as to details left no doubt as to the main facts which are to the effect that Lively was a trusted employee, who had full authority to draw checks on Mr. Roddey's bank account by any amount—not in his own favor of course, but in favor of the business. Mr. Roddey trusted him implicitly. A few weeks ago the canceled checks for July came directly into the hands of Mr. Roddey, more by accident than otherwise, and during a more or less casual examination of these checks, Mr. Roddey came upon one or two that he did not understand. He instituted inquiries, and these inquiries led to an examination of his cash books and journals where previously he had been giving attention only to his ledger. Then followed a little investigation of Lively himself. At first the young man appeared very innocent and piteous; but later he broke down, went into tears and confessed that he was a defaulter to the amount of \$250 or more. He stood high in the Methodist church and friends offered to make good any shortage up to \$500. They had no idea that there was anything wrong further than possibly a few inadvertent errors; but further investigation of the books showed that the shortage ran up into the thousands. This is the substance of the street story. The representative of The Enquirer went to Mr. Roddey for confirmation. He said he did not care to give out any information; but upon being pressed admitted the substantial accuracy of the facts outlined above. He said that he did not make good any shortage up to \$500. He could probably find out by paying \$500 to an audit company, but he was not sure that it would be worth that much to know. Lively is a graduate of Wofford college. He came to Rock Hill about five years ago and began working for Mr. Roddey at \$60 a month. Later his salary was raised to \$100 a month. He was married several months ago to one of the teachers at Winthrop. The story is that he has been buying fine furniture, diamonds and the like, and flying high generally. He is now in Birmingham, Ala., but as to whether he will be brought back for trial and punishment, could not be learned.—Yorkville Enquirer Aug. 22nd.

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
