On the evening of January 16, 1871, Washington and Morgan, not being satis-fied with their position at Grinda Spoals, moved westward toward Compens, with Tariton about hours behind them. Reaching Cowpens, Mogan and Washington determined to risk a battle signist Tarlton. The American forces were drawn up in two lines, the malitia in front under Pickens, the Colinentials under Howard on hundred and fifty yards behind. Some distance behind these waited Col. When the British at acked Pickens' line, after a brief esistance the malitia divided and etired behind Howard's line of Con-inentals. As the British advanced to attack this line it retreated slowl

Presently Pickens swept around Howard's right and attacked the British in the left flank At the same moment Washington awbpt around Howard's left and charged upon the anemy's right flank; while Howard's line, after, a few deadly colleys at thirty yards, rushed forward with leveled baye-nats.
