Be it ordained by the Mayor, and oard of Aldermen of the city of hester, in council assembled and y the authority of the same.

That it shall be unlawful for any erson, firm or corporation to conect or carry on within the city of thester any auction sale of horses duct or carry on within the city of Chester any auction sale of horses or mules, either or both, without hav-ing first, secured a license for such business. Such license shall be good for one year and shall be issued by the city chest upon the payment of him of the sum of two hundred that have been appeared to the con-trol of the control of the con-trol of t
