U.S. WANTS PEACE PRESIDENT TELLS CARANZA ENVOYS

Wilson Holds Two Conferences With American-Mexican Delegates and Declares This Country Desires to Help Establish Democratic Rule.

New London, Conn., Sept. 12.—President Wilson while here at the bedside of his sister, Mrs. Howe, took a hand in the Mexican conference today. He had two earnest talks with the Commissioners which brought right home to the Mexican delegates his realization that Carranza and his followers were standing on a problem of which they might not be quite completely masters, and that it was the sincere desire of the United States to help them in the establishment of a democratic government in a manner that would make for a lasting friendship between the two countries.

THE NEW YORK STRIKE STILL ON

Suspension of All Surface Line Night Traffic in Manhattan and Interboro Districts to Be Enforced Unless Cause's Grievances Recede.

New York, Sept. 13.—The failure of Mayor Mitchell and the Public Service Commission today to induce street railway officials to arbitrate differences with their employees found this city tonight still in the grip of the transit strike, now in its sixth day. Suspension of traffic on all surface car lines in Manhattan and the Bronx at night and infrequent cars during the day has packed the subway and elevated lines and caused great inconvenience to the traveling public.

DOUBLE VICTORY WON BY DORSEY IN GEORGIA RACE

Nearly Complete Returns Show Former Solicitor Secured Clear Majority of Both Conventions and Popular Vote for Governor.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 13.—In addition to carrying an overwhelming convention vote which nominated him for Governor on the first ballot, Hugh M. Dorsey of Atlanta, former solicitor of the Atlanta circuit, got a majority of the popular vote over his two opponents in the Georgia Democratic primary yesterday, according to nearly complete returns compiled here tonight. The convention which decided the primary nominee and adopt a platform, will be held in Macon September 6.

WILL RESPECT CHINA'S INTEGRITY, JAPAN SAYS

Washington, Sept. 12.—Japan has agreed to respect the American Ambassador at Tokyo that there is nothing in the recent demands upon China which threaten the integrity of that country or impair the Root-Takahira agreement, which pledged the integrity of China.

These demands, or "suggestions," at Japan said, followed a clash between Chinese and Japanese troops at Chengshing, and, according to the American Ambassador, called for the appointment of Japanese instructors at Chinese cadet schools, Japanese advisors at Chinese garrisons in South Manchuria, and Eastern Mongolia, and Japanese police in Chinese towns largely inhabited by Japanese, besides apologies and money indemnities.

Substantially the same account of the demands has been received from the American Minister at Peking.

In asking for a report on the Japanese demands, Secretary Lansing informed the country's representatives at Tokyo and Peking that reports in respect thereto, widely published here, "had greatly distressed the American Government."

"In diplomatic circles it was said today that Japan soon will declare her intentions that the Japanese Government is becoming irritated by the frequent publication of stories reflecting on Japan and its relations China."

Chinese officials here insist that German propaganda is responsible for these stories, and citing Mexico as an illustration, declare that Japan is taking upon itself the task of repressing anarchy by frequent publication of school instruction in Inner Mongolia and Manchuria.

THE BATTLEFIELD OF TIPECA-NOE

The battlefield of the famous Tippecanoe fight is almost exactly today as Harrison described it in his report of the battle—on a piece of oak land rising about ten feet above the level of a marshy prairie, and toward the west toward the "French Town, and nearly twice the rear, through which and near to this bank ran a small stream clothed with willows, and a plank-bench of logs, which extended considerably, but became gradually narrower in the opposite direction and at the distance of one hundred and fifty yards from the right flank terminated in an abrupt point."

It was at this battle of Tippecanoe in 1811 that William Henry Harrison broke the power of the Indian chief Tecumseh's confederacy, and gained that military renown which later won for him the Presidency.

TIMELY POINTERS.

1. Be sure to plant your orchard to make plants for next year.
2. Plant onion sets now for green onions during winter and early spring.
3. To have strong early-blooming panicles, the seed should be sown in the early fall.
4. It is not too late to plant winter kale or spinach—three desirable vegetables for fall and winter.
5. Sow cabbage seed during September, but for earliest spring planting, the plants will get a good start before cold weather and become thoroughly hardened by the time they are to be set.
6. Plan to have a strawberry patch. If your neighbor has strawberries, arrange to secure plants from him; otherwise, set in touch with a reliable nurseryman, who grows strawberry plants for sale. Early fall is the best time to set the plants.
7. A most satisfactory lawn can be made in the garden section where the soil is clayey, by using a mixture of Kentucky blue grass and white clover. Sow the seed in the early fall, preparing the ground thoroughly, and giving a heavy application of well rotted stable manure.
8. Resolve to have a good orchard. Set aside an acre or more of your best land to be devoted to orchard purposes only and plant it to recommended varieties of fruit. Give the trees the same careful attention as your best paying field crop and the result will not be disappointing.

ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the city of Chester, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same:

That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to conduct or carry on within the city of Chester any auction sale of horses or mules, either or both, without having first secured a license for such business. Such license shall be good for one year and shall be issued by the city clerk upon the payment to him of the sum of two hundred dollars and an additional sum of ten dollars for each animal sold or proposed to be sold in excess of twenty. Provided that this ordinance shall not apply to judicial sales, sales under chattel mortgage, nor to sales of stock that have been in Chester county thirty days.

Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment not over thirty days, and each sale or offering for sale of any horse or mule shall constitute an offense.
