DOMESTIC

Jesse L. Barnes, president of the food grain corporation, New York, and James F. Isell, general chairman of the marketing division of the food administration, Washington, D. C., say there is absolutely hot a scuffle of trust in reports of the possibility of four famines in the eastern states.

A train of grain from the Pennsylvania railroad was fired near Mineola Junction, Ohio. Four soldiers were wounded, one seriously. The wounded men were sent to the station and that there will be no further aid extended to the central powers.

Washington.—The Netherlands minister to the United States, Chevalier W. L. P. van Esch, has been recalled by his government. He called upon Secretary Lansing to announce the fact that he has been transferred to a European post to ascertain if Mynher van Rossem, his predecessor, can be accepted by the United States.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and John H. Root, secretary of state, delivered stirring patriotic addresses in Chicago.

Announcement is made that the trial by court martial of the 100 men accused of being members of the Twenty-fourth United States infantry clapped with having been involved in recent rioting at Houston, Texas, will begin at Fort Huachuca, Ariz., on Sept. 25.

Hull and Maj. Dudley Surpren have been named as judge advocates of the court.

Drafting of all aliens in the United States, except Germans, and others exempt by treaty and those of conscription age, will be suspended until Aug. 1. All men who have reached the draft age will be placed in a joint resolution passed by the United States Senate and sent to the house.

Negro soldiers of the Twenty-fourth United States infantry had planned a riot of bloodshed among the white residents of Houston two days before the draft was suspended.

On Aug. 23, according to the report of the military board of inquiry, which it is said is conclusive, General Chamberlain.

Supply Sergeant James M. Thomas, 29, of Philadelphia, Pa., and Private Joseph J. O'Farrell, 21, of Attica, Ga., 34 years old, members of the Fifth company coast artillery of the 10th regimental corps, were killed at Fort Monroe, Va., and are due to the result of drinking grain alcohol.

The army authorities are investigating a search and seizure of grain alcohol.

In a raid on the Philadelphia Tropic, a long-sold-out German language morning newspaper, which is charged with being a patriotic organ, government officials for several months past, federal agents arrested the editor, business manager, and composed largely of correspondence, files and documents.

Equal suffrage for Maine women was defeated two to one at the special election held on Aug. 15, according to newspaper results from two-thirds of the state.

Official and amateur members of the Virginia American Protective association were placed on trial in federal court at Abilene, Texas, charged with being in a traitorous open meeting in the Italian industrial mills.

Two police officers were slightly injured.

European.

A marked decrease in the destruction of British merchant vessels by mines or submarines is indicated by the latest figures issued by the ministry based in London. Twelve vessels of more than sixteen hundred tons and six of less than sixteen hundred tons were sunk to the bottom, against nearly twice that number the previous week.

Casualties in the British ranks reported to the ministry of war show a total of 26,216 officers and men, of whom nearly five thousand are missing.

The internal situation in Russia remains grave and chaotic, and just how it will be solved it is impossible to forecast. Apparently, the chief of the secret police, Korniloff, has been ousted by the rebels, who demands dictatorial power, will be replaced.

The war department announces that M. G. O. Chavasse, and Private W. A. T. Williams, members of Company F, Eleventh Light Engineers, have been slightly wounded by shell fragments while on duty.

What purported to be an outline of Germany's peace terms has been circulated in the German advance press.

Negro troops of the national army are to be trained in the United States and are to be used in the regular army and, as far as possible, will be trained in the same way they are trained. The call for negroes to enlist at their posts will be postponed to allow the officers at the camp to arrange for the organization of negro regiments.

Sweden's peace reply.

"Yes, we did it, but no one asked us not to," is a sentence the Swedes have often stated in reply to the question of whether they are to remain neutral.

The war department announces that the Baltic fleet is faithful to the Kerensky regime. Other advice says the commander of the southwestern army will be Korniloff.

Korniloff declares that his revolt, which Kerensky is animating by the highest efforts, is to be a warning to save Russia from a government dominated by the German general staff.

A Copenhagen dispatch receives that Germany will shortly be able to ship her peace terms. This statement is said to emanate from Dr. George Michaelis, the German chancellor.

The Italians have at last secured complete victory and isolate them, completely dominate the German plain, but the positions were gained at enormous loss of life, and there will likely be a lull in the fighting on that front, but the Germans will be unable to bury their dead.

The Germans delivered an attack against the French on the Aisne front, but were repulsed with heavy losses.

It is reported that the revolutionary faction in Russia are now after Kerensky, notwithstanding the fact he has already stopped the revolution and sent to the world through Amsterdam.
