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**Taxation Conference.**

Governor Ansel has appointed A. W. Jones, of Columbia; W. L. Mauldin, of Greenville; C. H. Stewart, of Beaufort; A. G. Brice, of Chester, and M. L. Smith, of Camden, representatives to the second international conference on state and local taxation, which meets in Toronto, Canada, October 6 to 9.

Mr. James Whitney, prime minister of the province of Ontario, and president of the council, has written to Governor Ansel requesting that he appoint delegates. All the large universities in this country and in Canada were also written to asking that they send delegates.

The object of the association is to formulate and announce through the deliberative expression of an annual conference, the best informed economic thought, the most administrative experience available for the correct guidance of public opinion, legislative and administrative action on all questions pertaining to state and local taxation and to interstate and international county taxation.

The association met last year at Columbus, Ohio—Columbia Record.
