The Storm on the Gulf.

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 30.—The first news by telegraph came of the stricken city of Mobile was received in Louisville at 3 o'clock this (Sunday) morning by The Courier-Journal, whose correspondent sent a dispatch in a round-about way from an improvised office in the swamps just at the edge of the city. The information is given in the dispatch that the loss of life in Mobile and vicinity from the great storm of Thursday will probably reach 120, although the death list in the city itself will not be large. The greatest number of lives lost, according to the dispatch, is at a place known as Santa Soul beach, a summer resort near Mobile, where 30 bodies are reported to have been recovered. The property loss in Mobile and along Mobile bay will probably approximate \$5,000,000.

Mobile itself is rapidly emerging from the confusion caused by the storm. Large gangs of men were kept working all of Sunday in clearing the streets of debris. Three of the steamer lines have commenced to run for the first time since Wednesday. The dock is rapidly being repaired, and business will be normal as soon as the railroads are able to run trains. As yet the Louisville and Nashville is still disabled and is the only road which is not able to maintain a schedule, and the time when that line will be open for regular traffic is conjectural. It will certainly be the best part of a fortnight before it will be running trains between Mobile and New Orleans. The Southern and Mobile and Ohio are running trains as before the storm.

Pensacola, Fla., Sept. 30.—It is difficult to give any adequate idea of the magnitude of the storm devastation here. The entire water front is a mass of the Louisville and Nashville railroad, spanning Escambia bay, was demolished and it will be many days before trains can go eastward.

Greenville Female College Sued.

Greenville, Sept. 29.—L. M. Hubbard, formerly director of music at the Greenville Female college in this city, has brought suit against the board of trustees of Furman university, who are also trustees of the Female college, demanding \$20,000 as damages for the alleged injury to his professional reputation. President E. C. James of the Greenville Female college is named as a defendant with the board of trustees. The answer of the college trustees has not yet been filed. D. Lewis Dorroh is the plaintiff's attorney. Mr. Hubbard had a conservatory in Atlanta before coming here. Mr. Hubbard has been at the head of the music department of the Greenville Female college for a number of years. Recently there seems to have been some friction between the director and the executive head, resulting in Mr. Hubbard severing his connection with the college and opening a conservatory of music of his own. The director claims that he was not treated right, and the president seems to entertain something of the same opinion of Mr. Hubbard. The matter came to a head recently when the official bulletin of the college announced the election of Mr. Hubbard's successor in wording which Mr. Hubbard alleges in his complaint, reflected on his professional ability and character. The damage suit followed.

The Greenville Female college has passed its fiftyth anniversary. It has prospered exceedingly in recent years and now has about 300 students. It is governed by the South Carolina Board of Trustees, which has been composed of trustees of Furman university and an auxiliary board.—Special to The State.

Frogs as Weather Prophets.

Frogs have from remote times been regarded as weather prophets, and at the present day in some parts of Germany the European tree frog (Hyla arborea) is used as a barometer. A few of them are placed in a tall bottle provided with miniature ladders, the steps of which they ascend during fine weather, seeking the bottom again on the approach of rain. Anatomical structures of a variety of kinds are characteristic of different species of frogs, having to do with the voice organs. So it is that many croak, some chirp and some almost bellow. Mr. Lawson D. Melton Resigns.

Mr. Lawson D. Melton has resigned as assistant United States district attorney for South Carolina to take effect at once. Mr. Melton, who was appointed to this office under District Attorney Jno. G. Capers and held out under Mr. Ernest Cochran, stated yesterday that his law business was such that he could not hold his position and at the same time attend to his practice. He did not know who would be appointed in his place and did not know who the applicants were. The position is under the control of the attorney general of the United States, but the recommendation of the district attorney is usually carried out. The Size of Crowds.

Some difference of opinion has been expressed by several of our "country weekly" contemporaries as to the size of the "Bryan crowd" in Columbia. The best way to estimate it is to actually count the people in one particular section of the crowd, then apply that to the whole, measuring as with a yard stick. This is the method used by The State at the Bryan meeting, and the estimate could not have been more than a possible hundred from the exact number. The State.
