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Letter from Rock Hill.

Rock Hill, Oct. 10.—The Seaboard railway surveyors, under Chief Thomas, reached Rock Hill Friday afternoon and are camping at Hutchison's grove. They are working on the line from Shelby to Spencer's crossing, and Rock Hill will of course be one of the objective points.

Rev. Mr. Sharpe and bride, nee Miss Walker of Yorkville, passed through Friday morning on their way to Yan Wyck, where Mr. Sharpe is pastor of the Methodist church.

The children of the late John Steele receive \$5000 damage against the Southern Railway, Carolina Division as damages for the railroad right of way through their home place, in the year 1913. This compensation is obtained for a nominal sum, a release of the right of way from the late John Steele, who was then in possession of the property. It turns out that he had only a life estate in the land, which he held under his grandfather's will, and that at his death it passed to his children.

News has reached the city of the raiding recently by Cuban insurgents of the large estate owned by the Carolina-Cuban Land Company, which was organized by the late John Steele, the efforts of Messrs. C. E. Spencer, of Yorkville, and W. B. Wilson, of Rock Hill, who are the principal owners of the property. Mr. Ogden Williams is in Cuba managing the business concern.

It is reported that the insurgents raided the plantation, taking away with them all the horses, cattle, etc.

Mr. Spencer was seen in reference to the reported loss, but had received no information on the subject. He estimates the live stock value at 86,000 or perhaps 100,000, but seems to think that Uncle Sam will adjust the trouble.

The First Presbytery of the A. R. P. Synod of the south will meet at Sharon in this county on Tuesday, Oct. 30, and will be presided over by Rev. J. M. White, moderator-elect.
