State of South Carolina, County of Chester.
Notice is hereby given that the General Election for Representatives in Congress will be held at the voting precincts prescribed by law in said County on Tuesday, November 6, 1906, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday in November, as prescribed by law.
The qualifications for suffrages are as follows: Every male citizen of the United States who has attained his majority, and who has resided in this State for two years, in the county in which he is to vote, for four months, and the payment of poll tax then due and payable. The Managers, their assistants and clerks of an organized church, in charge of public schools shall be entitled to vote, otherwise qualified.
Registration—Payment of all taxes, including poll, assessed and collectable during the previous year. The production of a certificate of the receipt of the other authorized to collect such taxes shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.
Before the hour fixed for opening the polls, managers and clerks must take and subscribe to the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers, and the Managers, who after being sworn, shall administer the oath to the Managers elect their Chairman and their assistants.
Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m. and closed at 7 o'clock p. m. in every part of the County of Chester, where they shall be opened at 7 a. m. and closed at 6 p. m.
The Managers have the power to fill a vacancy, and if none of the qualified voters, or some one designated by the Board of Managers, who after being sworn, can conduct the election, they may appoint a person or persons to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each ballot, and sign the same. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.

Notice of Election.

State of South Carolina, County of Chester.
Notice is hereby given that the General Election for State and County Officers will be held at the voting precincts prescribed by law in said County on Tuesday, Nov. 6, 1906, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday in November, as prescribed by law.
At the said election a separate vote will be provided at which qualified voters may vote upon the adoption or rejection of an amendment to the State Constitution, as provided in the following: Section 7, Article 21, of the Constitution, Relating to Municipal Bonded Indebtedness.
Section 7, Article 21, of the Constitution, be amended to read: "Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, that the following amendment to Section 7, of Article 21, of the Constitution, be approved: to add at the end thereof the following words: 'Provided, further, That limitations imposed by this Section and by Section 6 of Article 21, of this Constitution, shall not apply to the bonded indebtedness incurred by the City of Bennettsville, where the proceeds of said bonds are applied solely and exclusively for the purchase, establishment and maintenance of a water works plant or sewerage system, and the question of incurring such indebtedness is submitted to the freeholders and qualified voters of such municipality, as provided in the Constitution upon the question of their bonded indebtedness.'
Approved the 29th day of February, A. D. 1906.
There shall be separate and distinct ballots and boxes at this election for the following offices: (1) Governor and Lieutenant Governor; (2) Senators and Representatives in State; (3) Members of House of Representatives; (4) County Officers, which shall be the establishment of the person or persons voted for as such officers, respectively, and for which they are voted.
Before the hour fixed for opening the polls, managers and clerks must take and subscribe to the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers, and the Managers, who after being sworn, shall administer the oath to the Managers elect their Chairman and their assistants.
Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m. and closed at 7 o'clock p. m. in every part of the County of Chester, where they shall be opened at 7 a. m. and closed at 6 p. m.
The Managers have the power to fill a vacancy, and if none of the Managers attend, the citizens can appoint from among the qualified voters of such municipality, who after being sworn, can conduct the election.
At the election, the Managers and Clerks must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each ballot and sign the same. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.

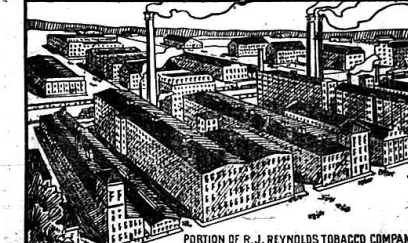
