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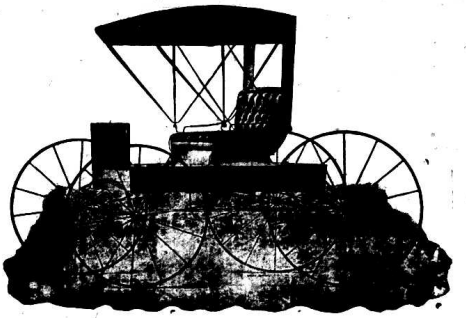

Will you sell morals for money? We do wish that the dispensary vote could be by roll call.

A blind man can see, always have the same way with blind tigers; they seem to be most numerous and active where they have the friendly shadow of one of the large animals that wear the collar and tag of the state.

There has never been an election in Chester county in which the women were so peculiarly interested as they will be in the dispensary election, and if they don't bring the matter up they will most likely be because they don't know the power of their influence.

It is very important that every democratic voter in this state cast his vote on Nov. 3rd. The light vote in the south, in the general election, brings unfavorable reflection upon this section and may be used to our injury. This is particularly true of South Carolina, where everything is thoroughly decided by the primary vote. Let every one arrange to go out and vote.

Who would have believed that a seemingly confirmed bachelor who is so busy as Poag, the real estate man seems to be, had any sentimentality left in him? Here it will be said, in his Real Estate Monthly.

The recent Tuberculosis Congress session condemned the practice of clearing that disease is often conveyed by such means. Married people, doubtless listen and take heed, but young lovers can still be depended upon to defy the danger and serve the poetry of literature and life.

The Columbia State deserves much credit for what it has done in raising Bryan campaign funds. It may be said that if the State had not led in this work some one else would have done so, but we doubt if any other would have done the work so strenuously and persistently and so successfully. At any rate the State has done it and deserves the credit. We remember that the State promised several weeks ago that the fund would reach \$5,000. It is already about \$1,000 past that mark.

The good people of Chester county have a right to expect of their leaders, in all movements looking to the betterment of the county, to be in all its interests. We believe that the effort to rid the county of the scourge of liquor is such a movement, and large proportions of the good people of the county join in that belief. Are they going to help or will they give their votes and influence to the other side?

Quoting bad language from another does not justify its use any more than the shooting of a man just because he is the plea that the gun was borrowed, unless it is in the furtherance of some good moral purpose, as we are here it is below. The expression is quoted verbatim. The conversation leading up to it is given in substance.

A man who formerly lived in Chester and was, for years, interested in the liquor traffic, thought a drinking man, was one day defending the business, in conversation with another citizen. The sale of liquor was desirable to be just as honorable as selling corn or bacon. Whiskey will hurt nobody who lets it alone. If people don't want to drink, let them stay away from the bar-room, and if they don't want their sons to drink, let them keep them at home. If they of their own get drunk it is their own fault, and the bar-room is to be blamed for it. Such was the argument.

The other party put in the remark, "Now, to bring the matter right home and test your position, suppose when your sons grow up they are large by comparison into the bar-room, the bar-keeper sells them whiskey, they get drunk and you find them reeling about the streets."

for money? How much money will you take to be responsible for setting the matter to the life of your son? When you do this you endanger also his character and his eternal welfare. For how much will you barter all that? Some say the drinking man will get whiskey anyway, and it is true, to some extent—only. But who will say that because an evil thing is going to be done anyway we are justified in doing it as a correct rule of action? If you knew that a certain man who has a large sum of money was going to be ordered and ordered, would you say it was right for you to murder him and put his money to a good use? The principle is exactly the same.

You cannot know that a drinking man is going to get drunk in any particular case, but if you could, and the man was your son, your brother or your father, would you frequent liquor joints and becoming drunkards, would you order a supply of whiskey to your home and say to them, "stay at home and drink, you will be safer here when drunk and in less danger of committing some desperate crime." Would you not rather have them go to your indignation with your neighbors and say, "Come let us clean out these joints. They have allowed ruined my family; they will soon do the same for yours."

Noting, Think of This. Liberty, Oct. 23.—John Hughes, a well known citizen, was shot by his sister, Mrs. J. A. Hunter, this evening, the ball striking her in the forehead, landing upward through her brain.

Hughes was intoxicated and had come in his brother-in-law's house to get a pistol to kill the town marshal. His sister was on the stairs trying to prevent him from coming out with the pistol. Hughes was arrested—Special to The State.

Laundry Sold. The Chester Steam Laundry was sold at public sale yesterday by Rev. L. A. Gaston, attorney, for \$500.

Is Chief Taylor Again. Acting upon information received, Mayor Caldwell sent a request yesterday to all members of the police force that any of them who were intoxicated while on duty send in their resignation. As a result, Chief Howe and Officer Grant handed in their resignations. Yesterday evening, at a special meeting of the council, a motion was nominated W. S. Taylor for chief; Alderman Carter nominated J. A. Stoen for re-election. The vote stood 3 to 2 in favor of Taylor.

Allderman White moved that Officer Grant be re-instated, and this was adopted by a vote of 2 to 1. Of course there were explanations, pledges and discussions, which are not given here.

Mr. Thomas Caskey Dead. Mr. Thomas Caskey, who had been confined to his bed for many months with lung trouble and had several times been apparently near death, died in the early hours of yesterday morning. Funeral services were conducted by his pastor, the Rev. C. G. Brown, yesterday afternoon at Pleasant Grove church and the remains were laid to rest in the churchyard.

Mr. Caskey was born near Pleasant Grove, within a few hundred yards of where he died, and there was his home all his life with the exception of a year or two spent in the West, just before the Civil war. He would have been 74 years old next February.

The deceased fought through the war in the Fifth regiment, and was the last of that group of Chester men who went into that regiment because the ranks of the Sixth were full, in which most their neighbors had enlisted. Another member of his company, Mr. Hilliard Gladden, preceded him only a few days.

Mr. Hamrick Resigns. Mr. J. R. Hamrick, who has been in the employ of the Seaboard Air Line for some time, has resigned, and Mr. G. M. Boland has succeeded him. Mr. Hamrick was considered by the officers of the road one of the best men in his department. He hasn't fully made up his mind what he will do, but will take a rest for awhile.

Sherman Exposed. Editorial Correspondence. New York, Oct. 26.—The World sprang the sensation of the campaign this morning when it devoted two and a half pages to exposing the connection of James S. Sherman, Republican vice presidential candidate, with a land company that proposed to secure a great block of public land for New Mexico at 3 to 5 percent of its value. The company first paid out \$150,000 money by means of "dummy" applications for 100 acres each. Workers in a Milwaukee brewery were the dummies.

But the promoters became alarmed and decided to permit the United States to sell the New Mexico Territory to all in 20,000 acre blocks. Sherman, general attorney for the land company, drew up a great block of public land for the house and was only held in the Senate by one objection, Patterson of Colorado.

Efforts have been made to day to get the Associated Press to carry the story. The World management assured me today they had done up the matter in everything printed and that it could be published. Sherman refuses to make a statement.

Some papers containing the story said that papers to stand in line with Sherman's home, were bought up and destroyed.

The "Pact" papers say not a word. "No party has ever had a respectable 'deal' from the press of America" thus the Democratic party is now explaining.

Death of Dr. T. B. Meacham. Dr. T. B. Meacham died at his home here this morning, after an illness of two weeks. His health, however, had been failing for a year or more. The funeral services are to be held in the Baptist church at ten o'clock tomorrow morning by Rev. L. R. Pruitt, of Charlotte, N. C., the pastor of the church. Rev. S. Keaves, being Dr. Meacham's son-in-law.

Don't Fail To Vote.
A copy of a letter that is being sent to state and county chairmen throughout the South by William Jennings Bryan has been received here by Mr. Giles J. Patterson, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee. Mr. Bryan states that he will not visit the South during the campaign, as his time is too much taken up with doubtful states, but that he hopes to take a trip to the South shortly after the election as president-elect and share with the people of this section in the general rejoicing that will follow a Democratic victory. After touching briefly on the platform, Mr. Bryan has this to say, which every Democrat in the South should read carefully and obey implicitly:
I do wish, however, that you would impress upon the voters of your section the necessity of polling the largest possible vote in the Southern States. There are two reasons for this. First, every vote cast in the South adds to the popular vote in the nation, and we need a popular majority as well as a majority in the electoral college. A popular majority will give a public endorsement and a moral support which will be needed in carrying out the policies outlined in the platform.

Night Riders in Arkansas.
McCreey, Ark., Oct. 26.—Outrages in the cotton districts of Arkansas, charged to night-riders, resulted in Governor Blodgett ordering the state militia to hold them in check. The cases to be called at a moment's notice. Several cotton gins have been burned and hundreds of notices have been posted in various parts of Arkansas, warning farmers "not to sell nor gin cotton" until better prices are given.

Gov. Pindall was moved to action by anonymous letters received saying that "no soldiers were wanted in this neighborhood."

Great Fire at Mullins.
Yesterday fire destroyed the fine three-story building of the Imperial Tobacco Company of Mullins. The fire spread so rapidly that many people were at work in the building barely escaped. The loss is estimated at \$400,000, nearly covered by insurance.
