NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The indications are that the following votes will be cast in the electoral college for Taft: California 11; Connecticut 7; Delaware 3; Idaho 3; Illinois 27; Indiana 15; Iowa 13; Kansas 10; Maryland 6; Maine 6; Massachusetts 16; Michigan 14; Minnesota 11; Montana 3; New Jersey 12; New York 36; North Dakota 3; Ohio 23; Oregon 4; Pennsylvania 34; Rhode Island 4; South Dakota 4; Utah 3; Vermont 4; Washington 3; West Virginia 7; Wisconsin 15; Wyoming 3. Total 309.

The following votes will probably be cast in the electoral college for Bryan: Alabama 11; Arkansas 9; Colorado 3; Florida 5; Georgia 13; Illinois 27; Indiana 15; Iowa 13; Kansas 10; Kentucky 9; Louisiana 9; Maine 6; Maryland 6; Massachusetts 16; Michigan 14; Minnesota 11; Mississippi 18; Missouri 10; Montana 3; Nebraska 8; Nevada 3; North Carolina 12; Oklahoma 7; South Carolina 9; Tennessee 12; Texas 15; Virginia 12; Total 174.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. Practically complete returns received up to a late hour tonight indicate that William H. Taft of Ohio, as president elect, will have a vote of 309 in the electoral college. This is within 16 votes of the forecast made by National Chairman Hittcock and 25 more than a majority out of the total electoral vote of 543.

The most important news of the late hours indicated that Maryland, after vacillating during the day and apparently being safe for the Democrat, has been swung into the Taft column by the official figures given Mr. Taft the state by 130 votes.

Maryland was the last of the doubtful states to be heard from. Indiana and West Virginia as well as Montana turned out to be safely Republican. Colorado went for Bryan.

Mr. Bryan has a total of 174 votes, less than he needed in 1906. In 1904 Mr. Parker received only 140 votes. In 1900 Mr. Bryan received 155 votes and in 1906 the Nebraska received 125.

Mr. Taft's electoral votes compared with 336 received by Roosevelt in 1904, 202 received by McKinley in 1900 and 271 received in 1896.

No element of material interest has been reported in the congressional returns today. The Republicans will have about the same working majority in the sixty-third congress as they present and Joseph G. Cannon of Illinois undoubtedly will succeed himself as speaker. Representatives Jesse Overstreet of Nebraska and William H. Dyer of Iowa are the most conspicuous among those who have failed of reelection.

The senate retains its Republican complexion, although there will be material change in the personnel of the upper body of the national legislature.

National Chairman Mack of the Democratic party issued a statement tonight in which he declared that he did not believe Mr. Bryan would again be a candidate for the presidency. He believed that the Nebraska might be a candidate for the United States senate in 1911, provided the legislature of his state is Republican in that year, when the 77th vacancy will occur.

The latest returns indicate that in the national house of representatives the Republicans will have 208 members and the Democrats 122, with 11 districts missing.

Judge Taft's plurality in the state of New York, according to corrected returns late tonight, is 203,405, more than 28,000 in excess of President Roosevelt's plurality of four years ago. Charles E. Hughes was elected in New York state by 11,159. The returns as between president and governor indicate a heavy splitting of tickets.

The heavy vote in Ohio made figures extraordinarily late owing to the immense size of the ballot. Mr. Taft carried his own State, however, by 50,000 plurality, a reduction of more than 200,000 from the Roosevelt vote of four years ago. The Democratic State ticket in Ohio, headed by Edison Harmon for governor, appears to be safely elected. The state legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Foraker, appears to be in doubt as between the Republicans and Democrats.

In Indiana, Mr. Taft was successful in carrying the State by about 8,000 but the anti-Democratic State ticket headed by Mr. Marshall for governor was elected. The congressional delegation from the State shows a gain of seven Democrats.

The returns from West Virginia owing to the mountainous character of the country, are slow in coming in. A sufficient number of counties and districts have been heard from, however, to show that Mr. Taft has a safe plurality.

Colorado early in the day shifted from the doubtful column to the Bryan list. The legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Teller, also is apparently Democratic.

Mr. Bryan's victory in his home State of Nebraska was a sweeping one. Five of Nebraska's six congressmen, while in the Democratic column, the legislature only 18 Republicans seem to be elected out of a total of 133 senators and representatives.

An exciting hour developed when the placing of Missouri, heretofore conceded to Bryan, in the doubtful column. Should tonight's returns

confirm the Taft lead, the Republican candidate will win 18 additional votes, making his probable total 327, two more than was originally claimed for him by National Chairman Hittcock.

HEYWARD LEAVES SAVINGS BANK.  
At a recent meeting of the board of directors of the Columbia Savings Bank and Trust company yesterday Ex-Governor D. C. Heyward tendered his resignation as president of the institution to take effect not later than the annual meeting in January. Gov. Heyward stated to the board that his resignation was taken by reason of the fact that his physician had advised him to give up work of this kind at this time on account of his health. The bank, which has recently moved into its handsome new building, is in excellent condition and Gov. Heyward stated that he gives up the presidency with regret. The announcement was received with universal regret by the directors, coming as it did just after Gov. Heyward had returned and was devoting himself with much zeal to the work.

After the meeting of the board Gov. Heyward said that in tendering his resignation he was taking no course that had for some time been considered necessary to complete restoration of his health. His physician had attributed his breakdown to last summer to the unaccustomed confinement to office work during the last six years, after a life spent on the plantation, and it is his intention now to devote himself as largely as possible, at least for the present, to his rice plantation in Colleton, since the rice industry is at this time most promising and conditions are more favorable than for several years. Gov. Heyward was in wretched health during the summer, but is considerably improved, though not yet a well man.

When asked if this meant his removal from Columbia, Gov. Heyward replied that for the present he did not have any plans looking to that end. The State, Nov. 5.

Blackstock, Nov. 3.—The many friends and visitors of Mrs. E. N. Shannon will be grieved to know that her faithful cook died Oct. 20th.

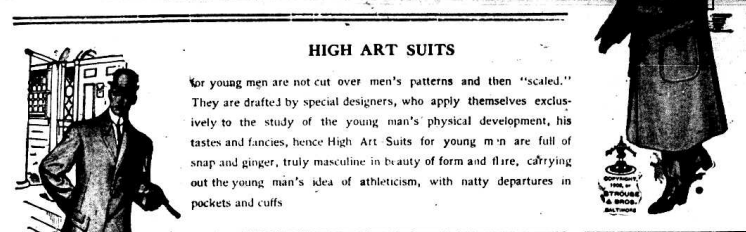

BRVAN TAKES DEFEAT GRACEFULLY

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 4.—While not caring to discuss at this time the political aspect of the Democratic victory in his home State or the cause, William Bryan, at this afternoon in an informal talk to a number of friends who called on him, expressed his pleasure at the result in Nebraska and his satisfaction it afforded him to learn of the election of so many of his political and personal friends.

The defeat he sustained yesterday did not weigh heavily on Mr. Bryan. He was one of the most cheerful of those at his home and seemed to be amused and interested with his visitors. Tonight Mr. Bryan was the guest at the banquet of the State Teachers' association, which he made a short address at. He has no other immediate plans than to rest at his home following his canvass.

Bryan For U. S. Senate.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 4.—While the returns are meager, the indications are that the Democrats have a majority in the joint ballot.

This morning a movement is on foot to elect William Jennings Bryan to the United States Senate. Bryan has asserted on both the stump and in his letters that he would rather be senator than president.
