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ALLIES ACCUSE KING OF GREECE

Reports That Monarch is Mobilizing Army to Co-operate with German.

London, Dec. 4.—That energetic measures against King Constantine and his Government will be taken by the Allies at once, apart from the despatch of Greek shipping in Entente effect, was announced today in the House of Commons by Lord Robert Cecil, War Trade Minister.

#### COUNCIL MEETING TUESDAY.

The city council held their regular monthly meeting last Tuesday evening, those being present Mayor Davidson and Aldermen Gae, Frazer, Stewart, Adams, Nichols and Dye.

The chief of Police Grant's report for the month of November was as follows: Arrested, 95; fined, 73; suspended, 1; continued, 4; discharged, 18; fines, \$427.57.

A committee from the Chamber of Commerce, composed of Messrs. A. O. Lloyd, G. R. Dawson and M. H. Clark, appeared before the council with plans for the purchase of the fair grounds. The first proposition made was that the city purchase the grounds for \$2,000 and take to purchase certain adjacent property thereto by public subscription. The plan finally adopted was that the city would pay \$2,000 and the Chamber of Commerce would undertake to raise the balance, \$3,000, by subscription, the property when purchased to be decided to the city and to remain the city's property perpetually, the city to have the right to place its stables on the point, the present city stable property to be sold and the proceeds applied to the purchase price of the fair grounds. This proposition was made on motion of Mr. Dye seconded by Mr. Cross.

Mr. Brown, a representative of the Nye Odorous Crematory Co., appeared before the council with a proposition to build a crematory, the plan to cost \$4,500. Mr. Brown was informed by the councilmen that in view of the financial condition of the city as present it would be impossible to entertain the proposition.

A petition from residents of Allen street for an arc light was granted.

On motion of Mr. Nichols, seconded by Mr. Frazer, the Southern Railway will be requested to place a light at the North end of the local passenger station.

On motion of Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Frazer, the Chester Machine and Lumber Co. was granted permission to install a gasoline filling station at their place of business on lower Gadsden street.

A number of cement sidewalk propositions were granted by Mr. Frazer, seconded by Mr. Adams, the salaries of both fire wagon drivers was increased from \$50 per month to \$60, to become effective January first.

Mr. Dye made the motion, seconded by Mr. Adams, that the city appropriate out of the amount earned by the carnival, \$50 for a banquet for the city firemen to be given in the near future.

#### INVESTIGATION ALLEGED FRAUDS WAS NOT IN VAIN

Probe in Tenth District, While Not Involving Anybody Directly Will Show Its Results in Future Elections.

Ashville, Dec. 6.—Ashville politicians, in company with the greater portion of Asheville's citizenship, are of the opinion that the investigation into alleged election frauds in this county has come to a definite stop, for this year at least. Inasmuch as the commission will be appointed to carry on further probe of the alleged use of money and other illegal practices in the recent election is regarded as unlikely.

The probe did some good, at least, and served, in a way, to demonstrate that there are some men in the county who are interested enough in electing such investigation to remain away from their homes and businesses for several days. It has also given a decided impetus to the demand of the people of this county that their Representatives in the General Assembly work for the passage of a bill requiring the passing of the Australian ballot in this State.

In order that the "absent brothers" during the recent probe may not rest too easily, there is still talk of a renewal of evidence before the original grand jury at the next term of Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases, and this, it is pointed out, is the logical manner in which to conduct an election investigation immediately in such a case, and it is believed that the body will get started and quicker results than any other method that can be devised.

Much smoke was also created in the probe just ended by Judge Adams, and a little flame was brought to light. The investigation put the politicians on notice that the people of the county are alive to any illegal methods used to subvert the will of the people at the polls and warned them that their acts are being watched.

It is believed that the probe, while failing to involve anyone directly, will show good results in the clearing up of the next election held in this county.

#### BODY OF JONAS DIXON FOUND

After Long Search Body of Negro is Found—Foul Play Suspected.

On November 22nd, Jonas Dixon, colored, who lives about three miles east of Blacksburg, on the Douglass farm, left home for the ostensible purpose of going hunting. Upon his failure to return home within a reasonable length of time a vigorous search was instigated. Upon his body was found last Tuesday by John Lipsey.

His body was found at the foot of a hill, on the Thompson plantation about four miles from where he lived and, an examination showed that he had died from a gunshot wound in the stomach. Circumstances surrounding the affair indicated that he had met with foul play. His gun was found about thirty feet from the body, one barrel being loaded and the other containing an empty shell.

Copier J. Henry Gladden held an inquest over the remains and after examining two witnesses deposed to hold the inquest open until after further investigation.

#### ROCK HILL WANTS NEW FEDERAL BUILDING

Comp. Finley's Proposed Bill Would Provide for \$125,000 Structure.

Rock Hill, S. C., Dec. 6.—Now that Congress has convened for the short session the citizens of Rock Hill and surrounding country are anxious to learn whether Congressman D. E. Finley will be able to have enacted his proposed bill providing for the erection of a new Federal building here for the postoffice and for the Federal Court.

The bill, which provides for a \$125,000 building, was introduced during the past session, but did not come back from committee. During the last campaign Mr. Finley expressed himself as hoping that he could get this bill through during the short session as he felt assured

of a favorable report from the committee. Besides, he said, it is necessary that Rock Hill should have a annual terms of Federal Court. The Chamber of Commerce will write Mr. Finley, urging that he may place on the calendar in order that it may be disposed of before the rush during the final days of the session. It provides either for the erection of a substantial addition and additional stories to the present building, or for the sale of the present postoffice site and the purchase of another site more suitable.

## EIGHT ABBEVILLE MEN HELD IN CONNECTION WITH LYNNING

Number Called by Solicitor, Who Seeks to Have All Defendants Bound Over—Magistrate, However, Gives Freedom to Half of Defendants.

Abbeville, Dec. 5.—Eight of the men for whom warrants were issued yesterday in connection with the recent lynching here of Anthony Crawford, as well as the negro, were held for the circuit court on charges of murder after a preliminary today before Magistrate Hammond. Solicitor Cooper, who represented the State, asked that all the defendants be held, but the magistrate bound over only eight of them.

Those who were bound over to face the court of general sessions are: J. V. Elgin, Sam Adams, Jess Cann, Will Cann, Sam Cann, Eugene Nance, B. Grant, H. B. Ferguson. The men released after the hearing are: Lester Cann, R. B. Grant, Sing Finlay, George White, Jr., M. E. Casey, Jim Dawson, John T. Cheatham and J. S. Banks.

Sam Eskine, for whom one of the warrants was issued, has not yet been arrested.

A number of witnesses were examined in the course of the hearing, but many of them seemed to know but little about the lynching of Crawford. Some of those named in the warrants were not mentioned by any of the witnesses. Shuman, Bush, Deputy Jones and Janlor McCland were among the witnesses called to the stand by Solicitor Cooper.

The warrants were issued yesterday following an investigation into the death of Crawford, who was taken from the Abbeville jail and struck by a mob. Crawford had been badly beaten by a mob before he was taken to the jail. A mob forced its way into the jail and took the prisoner out, putting him to death immediately.

### HOW TO REDUCE COST OF LIVING

Conductors of Forty Cent Day Experiment Give Reason for Their Success.

Chicago, Dec. 5.—Care in marketing and pains in the planning and preparation of meals offer the housekeeper the best weapons to combat the high cost of food, according to the dietary committee which managed the two weeks' experiment to prove that good meals can be supplied for 40 cents a day. The experiment in which 12 employees of the city health department participated ended today with a net gain of 45.75 pounds. The cost of the daily menus averaged a trifle over 30 cents.

Nine maxims to cut the cost of living were promulgated tonight by Dr. John D. Robertson, health commissioner; Miss Lillian A. Kempf, director of a school of domestic arts who had charge of the preparation of the meals; and Miss Anna C. Johnson, a dietitian. These are the maxims:

- Watch market and food advertisements daily.
- Menu-making requires time and careful thought, especially with regard to adequate amounts.
- Over-getting means additional expense.
- Watch fable refuse; it will be a guide both in planning and buying.
- Go to market and make your own selections, thereby getting better values.
- Buy staples in bulk so far as possible.
- Buy fruits and vegetables in season.
- Limit use of butter and eggs, especially while present high prices prevail.
- Use business methods in house-keeping.

### THE OLD FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH
