LOSS OF LIVES WILL REACH TWO THOUSAND

Estimated Two Thousand Lives Will Be Lost Before The Year Closes

Halifax, N.S., Dec. 7.—Smouldering ruins and piles of debris of destroyed houses continued today to show the extent of the damage done by the explosion of the British liner *Halifax* on the night of Nov. 21. Estimates of the number of dead at 2,000 or more appeared to be borne out by reports from the morgues and the number of bodies reported from hospitals, churches and schools where hundreds of bodies are being cared for by their more fortunate townsmen and members of relief societies from nearby cities.

Down from the city suffering from the frightfulness of its losses in human life and hundreds who had stood all night in the streets at improved progress continued their work with alternative expressions of grief and hope on their faces.

Over the flames-swept area of Richmond approximately two and a half square miles, many searchers could be seen as they hunted for bodies that all of the injured were removed to hospitals. Other organized parties sought for bodies that might be identified and buried in the morgues.

Across the narrow lanes in the town of Dartmouth the results of the vast damage done by the force of the explosion became more apparent today. While reports from the town of Dartmouth with a radius of 100 miles indicated that the force of the impact was felt and in some cases caused damage to property.

At Truro, Amherst and other places where the explosion was felt efforts to get into wire communication with Halifax continued. It is estimated that the gas port had more than a catastrophe, but it was several days before a wire was placed in operation to inform the outside world of the extent of the disaster.

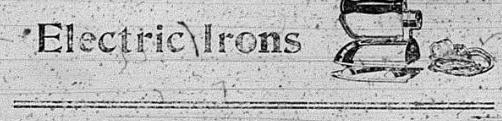

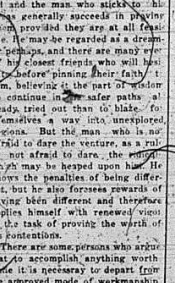
