An Unfortunate Affair.
Mr. H. A. Rensford, who runs a fruit stand in the Valley, is in the city lock-up awaiting trial for alleged assault upon his father-in-law, Mr. J. McIninch, at the latter's home on Calp street last night. Mr. McIninch, who is an old man and partially paralyzed, is likely to be laid up for some time as the result of his injuries, although Drs. J. G. Johnston and H. E. McConnell, who are in attendance upon him, said this morning that his hurts are not as serious as were at first feared, although they are sufficiently serious to keep him confined to his bed for some time.

Hard to Handle.

Williams saw him on Main street in front of the fruit stand and went up to arrest him. The negro made a desperate resistance and bruised Williams' arm considerably.

Chief Taylor went to the assistance of Williams and together the negro was landed in the guard house. He is a big strapping negro and hard to handle. He was taken back to Guthrieville, in York county, yesterday morning, where he is wanted. He said that this Huey negro is kin to the same negroes who raised so much disturbance here at a show a few years ago.

Mrs. Patrick Dead.
Mrs. Sarah N. Patrick, widow of the late J. H. Patrick, died at her home in White Oak Tuesday in the 82nd year of her age. The funeral was conducted by the Rev. J. A. White, assisted by the Revs. Oliver Johnson and J. A. Smith, the latter a son-in-law of the deceased, on Wednesday and the remains laid to rest by the side of her husband in the cemetery at White Oak in the presence of a vast concourse of relatives and friends.

Mrs. Patrick's husband died in 1906 at the ripe old age of 84 years. Mrs. Patrick's maiden name was Hayes and both she and her husband were originally from the Sharon section of York county. Some few years after their marriage they moved to White Oak and that has ever since been the family home.

Mrs. Patrick's general health was good up to six months ago when she began to decline. For 12 years she had been unable to walk on account of injuries received from falling.

Through all this illness in her life she maintained a uniform faith in her Master and displayed those graces that truly a Christian character. She is survived by the following named children: Messrs. B. A. T. G. and R. E. Patrick, of White Oak, R. O. and W. M. Patrick, of Woodward, R. O. and Madeline J. J. McDowell, of White Oak, and John A. Smith, of Charleena.

His death was unexpected. The funeral services were to be held at Harmony Baptist church this morning by Dr. J. Q. Adams, the pastor.

Mr. Corwell was born and reared four miles north of this city, but moved to York county many years ago. He leaves a wife and several sons and daughters. Mr. Corwell was a Confederate veteran, having rendered brave and faithful service as a member of Co. D. First S. C. Cavalry, Capt. W. A. Walker commanding.
