1 -	WOODEN LOOM SHUTTLES Includes five wooden loom shuttles that are used to transport thread in a loom quicker than human hands. These five loom shuttles are considered boat shuttles because of their shape. A bob of thread fit inside of the shuttles and was held in by the bobbin or axel. * See Appendix I for image of artifact.	ca. early-mid 1800s
1 -	SET OF HAND COTTON CARDS/COMBS Includes a set of hand cotton cards that were used to comb the cotton and make it ready for spinning. This set of hand cards was made by L.S. Watson & Co. of Leicester, Massachusetts. The inscription on the hand cards says, "The only genuine Old Whittemore Patent No. 10, Cotton, L.S. Watson & Co., Leicester, Mass" * See Appendix I for image of artifact	ca. mid-late 1800s
1 -	WOODEN SHOE LAST Includes one wooden shoe last that was used in shoemaking and shoe repair. The wooden shoe last is shaped to resemble a human foot. * See Appendix I for image of artifact	ca. early 1800s
2 -	CLOTHES IRON/SAD IRON Includes one clothes iron/sad iron manufactured by King Stove & Range Company of Sheffield, Alabama. * See Appendix I for image of artifact	ca. 1905
2 -	CAST IRON COBBLER'S STAND WITH FOUR FORMS Includes one cast iron cobbler's stand with four shoe forms. * See Appendix I for image of artifact	ca. early-mid 1800s
3 -	WAX BEAD NECKLACE Includes one wax bead necklace that is made to look like pearls. * See Appendix I for image of artifact	nd
3 -	EYELGASSES Includes one pair of eyeglasses that has octagonal shaped frames and also a sliding temple. The sliding temple on this pair of eyeglasses is a loop slide or a Jack Downing slide. The temples slide to a longer length for wearing and back to a shorter length for storing. * See Appendix I for image of artifact	ca. 1830s
