SWINDLING THE WARY.
They men have been arrested in New York for conducting an organized ring to swindle small corporations and banks. They realized between a half million and a million dollars in their operations, according to officials.

One naturally thinks of only the unwarly and the ignorant being swindled. But in this case it was the reverse. Men supposed to be possessed of keen business judgment were caught. It was said that their desire for gain by shabby methods that prompted them to swallow the bait.

Officials said that the ring was organized as a deposit company and offered capital to small corporations in need of financial backing. The victim would be told that all stock of his corporation should be pooled and the deposit company authorized to manipulate it through brokers on the curb market in Boston. With sufficient manipulation the price of the stock would rise and if could then be "unloaded" on the public at a large profit, the victim would be told.

In every case, however the plaintiffs were informed that stockholders of the small corporation must sign an agreement—giving their consent to the pooling of the stock and must make a substantial deposit with the deposit company to guarantee their good faith.

The victims would learn later that such an agreement violated the law making it a felony to manipulate stock prices. The deposit company would keep the deposit and the victims, fearing prosecution, would hesitate to place the case before authorities.

The swindlers worked on the theory that there are always to be found people who want quick profits even though the methods used are not in accordance with correct business methods. This is the basis for all swindlers. The sucker is promised the impossible and a little study will convince anyone that the investment which earns more than the average is not safe.
