"Peerless One" Receives Bad Blow in Home State.—"Expected It." Grand Island, Neb., July 27.—William Jennings Bryan, for eighteen years the leader of the Democratic party in Nebraska and a national figure in Democratic politics, was literally thrown out of his party here today by the vote of 133 to 147 against him.

It was the grand political tragedy of the day. Bryan, for years the idol of his party, was cursed and called a liar by opposition orators, and the delegates to the men who denounced the old leader.

"The Peerless One" was utterly crushed by the action of his party after the convention, which did not close until 1:30 o'clock this morning. "I expected it," he has well said. Bryan had been placed on the committee on resolutions. He brought into the convention a minority report in the advocacy of which an outside circumstance gives it. It is not thus with men. A little well placed publicity may be a great help.

Tillman's Health Much Better. Columbia, July 25.—Senator R. B. Tillman is much more interested in the construction of his new cattle barn and stable than in the result of the pending primary of the Democratic party for president. He is bending his entire energies and giving his attention to the construction of his stable for the one hundred and fifty cows that he has bought in Tennessee, and making provision for their care when they arrive in a few weeks time.

Senator Tillman's physical condition is of much concern to the people of the state, and it will be interesting to note that he is apparently in very good condition. He is now walking about without the use of a cane and what gave him most concern when he last was here, but now so trouble some. Mr. Tillman's general condition, to a layman, appears to be better. 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SHOOTING LEADS TO FRENCH.

French, Fla., July 24.—The rains during the past month no doubt have been the main cause of another large "fisk" on what is known as the prairie, three miles south of here.

Two years ago, while a freight train of the Atlantic Coast Line railroad, whose track passes over this prairie, was going south, the bottom dropped out of a large pile, and the train, with the exception of the engine and a caboose, was entirely taken down.

At a short distance from this point just such another hole has appeared, covering a space of 100 by 150 feet in diameter. While the depth is uncertain, as it is filled with soaking water under which large trees over 50 feet in height have disappeared.

It was first discovered up to the present, it has been steadily increasing in size, large portions of earth sliding down every hour, while the water boils and roars as if in a huge kettle. Considerable anxiety is felt by the railroad employees in running by this place, as the tracks of the Atlantic Coast Line are but a few feet from the edge and a giant has been placed there to give warning in case the track should be engulfed.
