For Hotel Inspector.

Sentor Carliels has introduced a bill in the senate providing for the erection of fire escapes in hotels, and in addition to this provision, there is a very important one, for the appointment of an inspector of hotels. He is to receive a salary of \$2.000 a year. He is to make an annual inspection of all inotels, and is granted police powers to enter any hotel at reasonable hours to determine whether the provisions of the act are being compiled with.
