"ALLEGED HISTORY" SAYS NEWS AND COURIER

First Declaration of Independence at Abingdon, Virginia.

To the Editor of The News and Courier: I dislike to play the part of "Benny Sniffers" in the "scrap" which is continually going on between you and Elder Caldwell...

Dr. G. B. White, of Chester, who takes a great interest in, and is well up on, history, loaned me a little book a few days ago entitled, "Missouri's Memorial Decade, 1890-1897. It is written by the Rev. George Miller, D. D., who was born and raised in Chester county, South Carolina."

He was a minister of the Presbyterian church, and lived in the Northern wing of the church when the separation came.

In his book he describes the war and its attending results in Missouri during these years, and in opening chapter he speaks of the injustice that has been done the South, saying that this section "has never received her share of credit for her contribution she has all along made to all the best attainments of our national life and history."

After giving two reasons for this, first, the fact that the standard histories of America have been written from a New England standpoint, and second, the prejudice raised against the South by the abolition movement, he says, "we should remember that for one hundred years prior to the civil war the Southern States furnished the largest part of the best elements of our colonial and national life."

The first "Declaration of Independence" made among the colonies was made at Abingdon, Virginia, 1776, seven months before the one made in Philadelphia; and the second was proclaimed in Mecklenburg, N. C., on May 21, 1776, thirteen months prior to that at Philadelphia. This is the item of alleged history as given by Dr. Miller.

Dr. White tells me that there was once an Associate Church at Abingdon, Va., and this may account for their Declaration, for they were usually Scotch-Irish, of the same ilk as the Mecklenburgers, and always on the side of liberty.

Now comes the Rev. C. E. McDonald, D. D., pastor of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian church at Abingdon, South Carolina, with aid and comfort for the Charlotte Observer, the common enemy of historical truth, the inalienable rights of the South, and an exacting description of the New York Sun. Dr. G. B. White, who is also a Seeger, and lives in Chester, is a great collector of historical curiosities. His book "Missouri's Memorable Decade, 1890-1897" was written by a preacher by the name of Miller, a Hymn-singing Presbyterian, who was in Chester county, and left this state just before the war and settled in Missouri, where he died. He was opposed to the institution of slavery, and after he returned he was set over to the Northern Presbyterian. In the opening chapter of his book he says among other things that the first Declaration of Independence was made at Abingdon, Virginia, in February, 1775, seven months before the one made at Philadelphia, and the second was proclaimed at Mecklenburg, N. C., on May 21, 1776, thirteen months prior to that at Philadelphia. And this, as Dr. McDonald says, is "alleged history." The South has never received her share of credit for her part in our National life and history, and attributes her responsibility to the best and most reliable standard histories of America have been written from New England

A BIG SCANDAL IS PROBABLE

ASYLUM FOR THE INSANE TO BE INVESTIGATED

Committee Appointed by the Legislature to Look into the Matter.

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 22.—A bill was introduced in both branches of the Legislature today calling for a legislative commission of three Senators and four members of the House to investigate the affairs of the State Hospital for the Insane and report its findings with recommendations to the next session of the Legislature.

The bill gives the committee all the powers of a court, providing for a marshal and stenographers, powers to send for persons and papers and full authority to rule for contempt. It not only authorizes secret sessions but requires all who may attend the meetings as witnesses, defendants, attorneys or otherwise not to disclose any part of the proceedings or testimony under pain of being ruled for contempt.

The bill carries an appropriation of \$3,000 to defray expenses of the hearing and a further sum of \$5 and mileage of 5 cents a mile traveled and witnesses being allowed \$2 a day and the same privilege.

The bill is introduced upon a letter to the General Assembly from Dr. J. W. Batcock, superintendent of the institution, who has been in charge for ten years and who achieved some credit for his management.

The board of regents and the superintendent of the State Hospital for the Insane respectfully urge the attention of your honorable body to the inadequacy of the present provision for and accommodations of the hospital, and the desirability of making certain changes affecting its welfare.

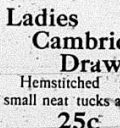

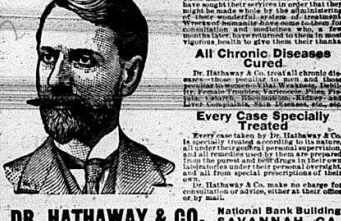

The Automobile Club of America will continue to be the governing body so far as racing is concerned, but the club is in the authority to sanctioning of international events which leaves open a field for another governing body.

Before the ground freezes hard it is well to lay by a good supply of the road dust for the hens to bathe in during the winter months. It is also a good idea to secure several barrels of leaves and grass or other fine litter where stock is kept not on the place. So that the poultry will have something to scratch in.

Experiments which have been conducted by the department of agriculture show that the dairy lamb should be so constructed that there will be four square feet of window glass for each cow and large enough so that there will be 200 cubic feet of air space for each animal. It should have inlets and outlets for air, but the ventilation should be so arranged that the air will not be subjected to drafts.

The oleomargarine manufacturer should not try to associate on terms of equality with the dairy cow. There is nothing square, honest or legitimate in the attempt which the makers of oleo make to pass their adulterated butter as pure. As far as wholesome food is concerned, oleo is probably all right, but it should sell as such and not as dairy or creamery butter.
