NEW FORM OF GOVERNMENT FOR CHESTER COUNTY

Below will be found the full text of the bill to provide for a system of County Government for Chester County. The bill was introduced in the legislature by Chester county delegate...

Section 1. That the office of Supervisor of County Clerks and of all other employees, agents and servants of the county, shall be determined and fixed by the said Board of Directors and shall be as follows...

Section 2. That a Board of County Directors of Chester county, to consist of three (3) members, to be elected by the voters of the county...

Section 3. That the Board of County Directors shall elect from their number a chairman, upon whom may be devolved the duties of the office...

Section 4. That all the duties, obligations and functions now imposed by law upon the County Supervisors, the County Commissioners and County Supervisors of Chester county, may be continued with the present Board of Directors...

Section 5. That it shall be the general duty of said Board of County Directors for the discharge of their duty to provide for the maintenance of the county's business...

Section 6. That the said Board of County Directors is hereby authorized, and required: (1) To employ competent persons to take charge of all public works of every character...

Section 11. That said Board of County Directors is hereby authorized and empowered to provide adequate means and facilities for properly supporting and caring for all persons who by reason of age, poverty, or infirmity or may be committed to the county...

Section 12. That said Board of County Directors of Chester county shall be provided with the following powers: (1) To exercise and discharge all the powers, duties and functions of the County Supervisors...

Section 13. That all acts and parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, be and are hereby repealed. All such provisions of the general law which conflict with the provisions of this Act, be and are hereby repealed.



### New Industry For Chester.

Of interest to many Chester people, especially the farmers, is the fact that Chester is soon to have an ice cream factory. The new firm will be known as The Peerless Ice Cream Factory and will be located in one of Mr. H. W. Hatter's buildings adjoining the Chester Laundry.

Mr. C. T. Hollinger, of Rode Ga., and Mr. T. L. Pearson, of Laurel, Miss., are to be the proprietors of the new business here and have been in Chester making arrangements for the building for the past few days. Both of these gentlemen are experienced in the business and state that they already have the machinery for the plant bought. They expect to be ready for business here about the middle of March.

Of interest to the farmers of this section will be the fact that the new factory will use considerable milk, of course depending on the amount of ice cream sold. For every gallon of ice cream sold it will mean one-half gallon of milk. The capacity of the plant will be five hundred gallons per day.

The gentlemen above mentioned have already taken the matter of securing milk up with County Agent Sanders, who will gladly assist them in securing milk in this county.

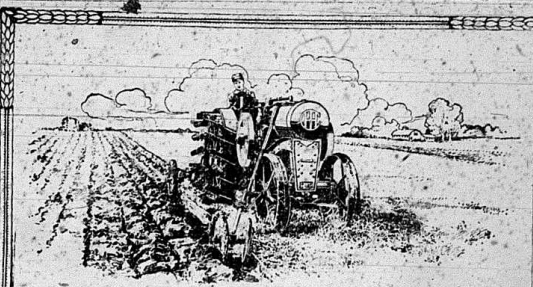

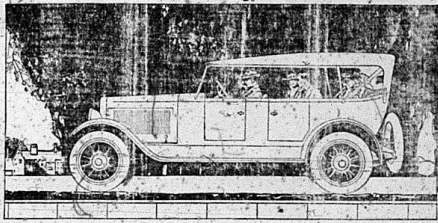
