FURNITURE WOODS.

Identification of Furniture Woods Made Easy by New Government Bulletin. How the home owner, the interior decorator, the student of home economics and planing training, and many others besides the furniture dealer and manufacturer may readily differentiate the various woods used in furniture, is explained in "The Identification of Furniture Woods," a recent publication of the United States Department of Agriculture, prepared by Arthur Koehler, Wood Technologist of the Forest Products Laboratory of the United States Forest Service. The identification is made by means of the structure of the wood, which is not obliterated by stains and wood finishes, and which can be easily observed in any finished product. The differences in structure described are such as can be seen with the naked eye or a low power magnifying glass. The descriptions are supplemented by many half-plate photographs showing the structure of the wood in end, plain-sawed, and quarter-sawed surfaces of oak, chestnut, elm, ash, birch, rosewood, mahogany, cherry and various other woods. A key for tracing down the identity of a given piece of wood is provided in the text. The circular also discusses the relative merits of veneered and solid furniture and gives directions for the proper care of furniture. The publication is issued at the Department of Agriculture, Miscellaneous Circular No. 624. It may be obtained for 25 cents per copy from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C. 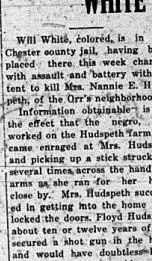
COTTON

INDUSTRY LOOKS TO 'OPEN SPACES'

Trend Today is To Decentralize of the Manufacturers. Electric power will eventually decentralize industry, and garden communities devoted to manufacturing take the place of congested factory centers, according to Roy E. Tripp, head of the board of directors of the Westinghouse Electric Corporation. He figures it out this way: "The first electric light and power plants were naturally located in congested districts, where a ready market for their services was assured. Thus, the full benefit of electricity were for the most part bestowed upon populous centers, through intensifying the existing tendencies of the United States. Today, however, the nation is being covered with a great network of electric power lines. There are now in existence over 100,000 miles of high-voltage transmission lines, and this mileage is increasing rapidly. "Under this extensive super-power development, power will be widely distributed and industries will be free, as far as power considerations are concerned, to locate, roughly speaking, almost anywhere.
