BETTER PAY FOR TEACHERS.

The economic disorders which have followed the war about to disrupt the city's teaching force. Nearly 1,000 public school teachers have resigned since September. Their places cannot be filled at the salary rates now prevail. Living costs have risen to such an extent that teachers actually are getting from 30 to 50 per cent less in real money than they got before the war.

In the private schools tuition fees have been raised. But in the public schools there is no source of added income except the city treasury. And, unfortunately, the city employees who do the real work of the city—like the firemen, the teachers and the policemen—already find it hardest to overcome the reluctance of the political authorities to reward efficient service.

The teacher class is one of the most self-sacrificing units in the community. It luckily is inspired by a high professional ideal and a long cultivated sense of duty. Otherwise there would be few teachers left today. Teachers also perform one of the highest tasks of the community, not just because they give much selflessness of the public usually expects them to give more.

The war has had a calamitous effect in destroying the old balances between earnings and cost of living. A limited class has benefited enormously, both absolutely and relatively, from this economic dislocation. Most others have been drawn into a fierce struggle to restore the old equality by pushing wages up to the new level of prices. In some industrial occupations this level has been attained completely. But there are many other occupations in which, instead of a 100 per cent equalization, only 25 to 10 per cent equalization has been reached. In still others there has been practically no progress at all toward equalization.

The groups which have been the most conspicuous victims of the economic upheaval and of society's inability to alleviate their losses, deserve great public sympathy. Their lot ought to be improved. The only rational economic goal for the city is a nearly complete equalization of the gains and losses of war readjustment.

It is one thing for the public to resent further demands for increased wages from groups whose wages already have increased 50, 80 or 100 per cent. They are near the end of the process. They can let up for the moment. But it is another thing to support wage increases for groups like the teachers who have been caught in a back alley, who have had practically no advances in wages and who have to bear the burden of a general inflation from which they have had no benefit.

New York's teachers ought to be better paid. They are entitled to larger salaries. And they are also doing a social work which it would be dangerous to abridge any further by continuing to deny them a plain, measure of economic justice.—New York Tribune.

BURNS TO DEATH
IN MORNING FIRE

Ben A. Best Loses Life When Savannah River Lumber Company's Hotel is Destroyed.

Ulmur, Feb. 18.—Ben A. Best, formerly of Ulmur, was burned to death in Savannah River lumber company's hotel at Gilman Monday morning at 9 o'clock. He had been a faithful employee of the company for the past three years working at night. He went to sleep about 7 o'clock this morning, the building catching on fire at 9 o'clock and in the excitement the mill crew forgot to wake him up. He was 52 years of age and leaves two brothers and two sisters: G. A. Best and Mrs. Anna Kirkland of Ulmur, and W. K. Best and Mrs. H. L. Kearse of Olar.

Asheville, N. C., Feb. 15.—Surg. Gen. Ireland announced in a telegram, received here today that a typhoid epidemic is spreading under conditions at the United States army general hospital No. 19 near here, as a result of charges made by scores of patients in hospital and by letters to senators and to the local newspapers. The complaints, many of which were underrighted, grew out of an alleged riot at the hospital Thursday when a guard is said to have struck a patient with a gun. Several ailments also attributable to the hospital from North Carolina to request a civilian investigation into food conditions at the hospital.

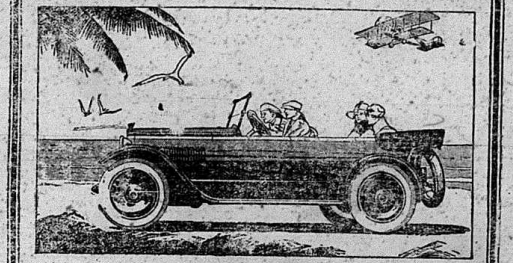
